"Embrace Your Accomplishments with Our Legacy of Service"

District 4-C5 Mentorship Program <u>Reprinted</u>

As a district that takes pride in emphasizing training as a key element of our overall goals and objectives, there is a need

to seek out powerful ways to grow and develop the skills of our membership. A review of the literature suggests that today's leaders from all walks of life, have had the benefit of a mentor's wisdom and experience.

The question is, how might a mentoring program benefit our entire organization? Mentoring is more than just a cost-effective alternative to traditional training programs. It promotes knowledge sharing, leadership development, skill development, and engagement throughout the entire organization.

Membership wise we have had some good years and some poor years. Each year District 4-C5 brings in as many members as leave. Information passed on from LCI suggests that the highest rate attrition is during the fourteenth to the eighteenth month of service, and some sources suggest that the more accurate range is closer to six months to fourteen months.

Although as a district we are not that good at performing exit surveys with the members who leave, we hear when attending the Council of Governors and other events outside our district, that the top reasons that Lions drop, centers on 1) their club not doing regular service projects and the member not having a 2) true understanding of Lionism.



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BLIND PROJECT: Sacramento Valley Model T Club (Part One)

"Blind Project" SVMTC (Sacramento Valley Model T Club)

Recently Northern California Lions Association (NCLSA) was approached by Lion Harvey Bandy, member of the Country Club Lions Club letting us know that the Sacramento Valley Model T Club (SVMTC) that he belongs to will sell a Model T with the proceeds to go to NCLSA.



Lion Harvey attended an NCLSA meeting several months ago to share with our members that the Ford Model T was being built of various parts of numerous donated Model T parts. All parts were donated by the SVMTC to be restored and assembled onto the finished Model T frame.

The Model T has a 1926 Model T rebuilt engine that was among the donated parts. A 1923 Model T Touring body was also donated. The project began during 2015 and it was recently completed by members of the SVMTC.

The members of the SVMTC made arrangements with the California Auto Museum to place the Model T on the floor area of cars for sale at the auto museum. I recently visited the auto museum and was able to get close enough to take several photos of the beautiful Model T Touring car. It is painted the typical black color that was often used during that era. The black leather seats set off the interior beautifully.

Prior to the Model T being brought to the auto museum, it was thoroughly tested for road worthiness by members of SVMTC.

The Model T will be sold according to the arrangements with the auto museum and proceeds will be donated to NCLSA upon the sale of the car.

We thank the members of the SVMTC for their generous donation of not only all of the parts that were needed to complete their "Blind Project", but also for all of the countless hours contributed by their members.

After submitting the first article to the District Editor of the Pride, we were notified by Country Club Lion Harvey Bandy (also a member of the Model T Club of Sacramento) that the 1923 Model T was sold to a purchaser living in England.

Before the beautiful Model T was scheduled to be shipped, members of NCLSA were invited by Lion Harvey to attend a presentation of a check from the Model T Club of Sacramento. NCLSA President Zenny Yagen, CFO Doug Wight, and Lions Faye Young and Ernie Takahashi were present during the fun ceremony. Besides the members from NCLSA, numerous members of the Country Club Lions were present, including Lion Harvey and President Dave Eichner, members of the car club and representatives from the California Auto Museum, including Executive Director Delta Pick Mello were all there enjoying the festivities.





As indicated in the first article, the Model T club had agreed to donate the proceeds of the sale of the car to NCLSA. The car was put on the floor for sale at the museum and it quickly sold to the purchaser who lives in England.

Thanks go out to the Model T Club, the California Auto Museum and the Country Club Lions, all who had a hand in the building of the classic old car and the process of selling it once it was completed.

LIONS UNIVERSITY: In Name Only

LIONS UNIVERSITY ... IN NAME ONLY

Lions University came into being during the Fall of 2014 and it was not until three years later that It became a blip on my radar. What a coincidence, I thought, a university with the same name as our be-loved organization. I wondered why I had never seen their name in football or basketball scores. Perhaps they are principally dedicated to achieve academic excellence. I was wrong on all counts.

I was surprised after a little more probing that Lions University is not a traditional corporate university at all. While they do adhere to that fact with a rather lame disclaimer, they seem perfectly content to continue their course and pretend that they are. They lure a constant stream of Lions members to participate in a leadership curriculum of three program levels, and upon completion of the required courses, the "graduates" are bestowed with their coveted "degree", be it "Bachelors", "Masters" or "Doctorate". But in order to fully qualify for their award, they are also required to attend, at their expense, a forum that is designated in a different area each year.

For anyone who has attended a traditional college or university, one is fully aware of the demanding study needs, many times into the wee hours of the morning, not to mention the massive infusions of caffeine to keep from nodding off during an important test or lecture. Needless to say, there are many sacrifices to be made to get to graduation day. Even a twoyear investment to attain an 'Associates of Arts" degree is much more demanding than "earning" a "Doctorate" from Lions University. I have it from reliable sources that one can work it so that all three degrees from Lions University can be accomplished in less than a month of studies. For those who possess a legitimate Doctorate, it is fitting to proudly display it on a resume'. One can only wonder how many of these Lions University counterfeits are promoted in the same manner.

This is certainly not intended to be an indictment against the establishment of the program to make Lions members better leaders of tomorrow. With comprehensive training intended to instill leadership skills, L.U. seems to be meeting that goal. LCI is, however, remiss in setting this up as it now stands. Did they not think, for example, that the name LI-ONS ACADEMY would be more accurate than maintaining the sham of a "university?" Achievement awards could again, for example, be designated as "Basic", "Intermediate" & "Advance." And the requirement of attending a forum should be eliminated, for it seems that the purpose is to obtain a larger number of forum attendees.

Last, but not least, is the problem associated with the L.U. "Bachelors" degree. 'History 101' is a required course, and while it deals with the history of Lions Clubs International, a CD of an hour+ also tells the listener how the founding came about. As with all the official Lions Clubs sources, June 7, 1917, became the date that Melvin Jones in Chicago hosted a number of clubs and civic minded leaders from different parts of the country, including Dr. Woods from Evansville, Indiana. The CD source states that Dr. Woods turned over all claim and title of the Lions name to Melvin Jones in return that Mr. Jones would assure that Dr. Woods would be elected president at the Dallas Convention of October 8--10, 1917. Melvin Jones was NOT a Lions member at that time, and Dr. Woods turned over all ownership titles of his clubs to the Lions delegates at the Dallas Convention of which he presided. Melvin Jones' II-page dissertation of his version of the founding did not contain this episode.

Despite concerns and significant criticism from Lions Clubs members at large as to the structuring of L.U., it appears certain that Lions Clubs International is determined to stay the course and will provide little more than lip service to fend off any and all changes that are brought to their attention.

"Cal scored late in the game for 7 points but alas, too late to win," said Bob, explaining the strange (but famous) score.

Sue, who was born on a Big Game Day between Cal and Stanford, was very close to her father and went to all of the football games in Berkeley. The couple tells how Sue's affection for Cal affected the romance between her and her future husband, Bob.

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


