District Governor Doug Wight's Message

songs – she still has her strong country western voice. It was a thoroughly enjoyable morning.

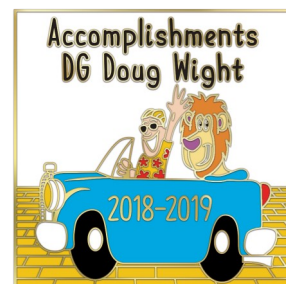
Before the convention, we concluded three intensive days of District Governor Elect training sessions and on Tuesday, July 3, International President Gudrun Yngvadottir was installed as our first woman President of Lions Clubs International. Immediately following her installation, President Gudrun installed all of the District Governors. At that moment, a rush runs through you. It was an amazing feeling to me to be able to be officially installed as District 4-C5's District Governor. I look forward to serving as your District Governor and will be visiting your clubs once that schedule has been finalized. Our newly elected International President Gudrun Yngvadottir's theme is "Beyond the Horizon." We have some challenges that we are facing, mostly in increasing membership and retaining the members that we currently have as of the end of June. We anticipated many drops and unfortunately, the clubs in the District dropped 116 members from their rosters. We are looking forward to growth in our District with new clubs and adding new members to the existing clubs in the near future. We hope to be able to get back to our 1,500 plus members in the District in the upcoming months.

We will be offering a number of training sessions that are in the planning stages.

The existing MyLCI website will continue to be used to report activities until June 30, 2019.

I am looking forward to working closely with the new Cabinet to make the next twelve months the best for all.

While I have shared some information with you so far, please remember that while I am your District Governor, you will hear from all of us on the Cabinet that it is a huge joint effort by all to make this a successful year for District 4-C5. We look forward to seeing all of you during the upcoming months.

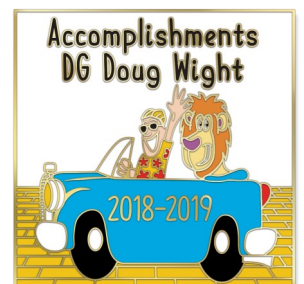

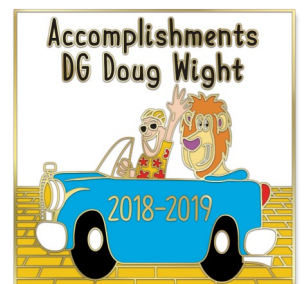

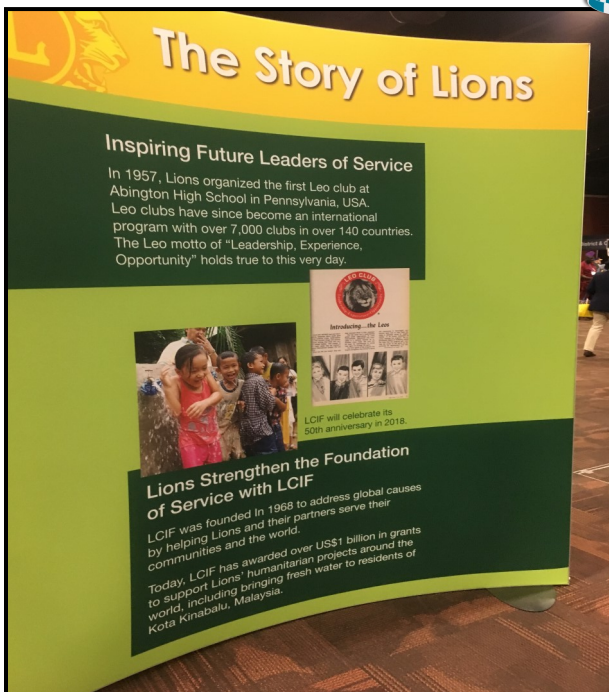

Erin Boetzer, Canine Companions Puppy Raiser

Erin Boetzer was a normal kid playing soccer, riding horses, and going to school. But when she got into high school her life totally changed. She was sexually assaulted and didn't know how to deal with the emotional distress and the thoughts that went through her head. She blamed herself and kept her secret hidden and it just ate away at her soul. She did things to numb the pain and isolated herself from friends and family and eventually this led her down a path of addiction. She did things that she would never do sober. It drove her family away and she lost many friendships. Eventually she got arrested. It took her awhile to accept responsibility for the things she did and realized it was time to make a change. Then she was able to move forward with her life.

She was sent to Folsom Women's Facility which was the best thing that could have ever happened to her. While she was there she got a second chance at a new beginning. Erin had time to discover who she was. She decided to get sober and start doing positive things for herself. She took some college classes. She wanted to keep busy instead of just sitting around wasting time. When she got her first set of grades back, she got all A's. She was thrilled. She didn't think she had it in her. So she enrolled for another quarter and continued this success with college. When she left prison, she had an AA degree and a 4.0 GPA. Not a bad for someone who was hoping to at least pass.

After Erin was at Folsom Women's Facility for about six months, they started Canine Companions for Independence (CCI) puppy program. They started with



two dogs and four women. She was not part of the original group, but she was in the next group when they expanded the program to six women. To even be considered to be part of the program you have to be disciplinary free, you can't have certain crimes and you are approved by the Warden. So for Erin, it was

an honor to qualify and to be chosen to work with these dogs. She applied for this for this job first because she loved dogs and second, she wanted to give back to society for everything she had taken away from it for so many years.

When Erin was accepted into the program she was still discovering who she was and didn't have a lot of confidence due to being judged because of the poor choices she had made and because she was a drug addict. When she met Carly Fermer, the contract trainer and Chris Gerard, who helped get the prison program up and

running, they were very kind and accepting towards her. They treated her with respect and made her feel like a human being which she hadn't felt like in awhile. They made her realize that not everyone judges people and that there are still genuine people out there that you can trust.

And that made her realize also that she needed to give herself another chance and to be kind to herself and to start respecting herself.

After working with Canine Companions it helped Erin bring out the woman that she had buried deep inside because of everything she went through.

She went from this weak, broken woman and changed into this strong, brave person who changed her life around and was ready to take on leadership roles. She got more responsibilities and started training all the new girls. The girls could come to her with questions and she learned many new tools that would help her when she got released. She learned patience, compassion and how to communicate with all different types of people. But the most important thing she learned was it wasn't always about her. She also learned to put others needs before her own.

Having Canine Companions in the prison didn't just benefit the woman working with the dogs, it helped the rest of the girls also. The inmates would get to see the dogs every day. And in some cases if one of the girls lost a loved one while incarcerated they would bring the pups to that girl so she could feel the unconditional love of these amazing dogs. It was amazing for the girls training the dogs knowing they could bring comfort to someone in such a painful time in their life.

Erin has been released and her relationship with Canine Companions continues to flourish. They asked her to finish raising Ticha II, the puppy she was co-raising in prison. She was so honored to be asked to do that. It showed they believe in her enough and trusted her with one of their dogs. Now she is on her fifth puppy, Dern, that she is raising. He is named after their puppy program manager James Dern, which is quite the honor. She also has been given the opportunity of being a contract trainer for Canine Companions in San

Francisco. This means she trains the puppy raisers how to train their puppies! Canine Companion has done so much for Erin she wanted to do something in return. She was the first person in the country to form a community support partnership with a company for the "Give a Dog a Job" program. She was able to get two of her local Starbucks to participate and now they have fundraising stations set up inside the Starbucks to help raise money for this amazing organization.

Canine Companions has been such an important part in Erin's life. They gave her a second chance at a better life and kept her away from the terrible life of addiction. She is a proud, strong woman that has goals and ambition. She has the determination to make not only her life better, but for others as well. She now has the confidence in herself to share her story with hopes that it inspires or gives hope to others. She feels so blessed to have had Canine Companions enter her life. They help change everyone's life that they touch. The people that are associated with Canine Companions are absolutely amazing. Erin feels so blessed to be a part of this amazing organization and family.

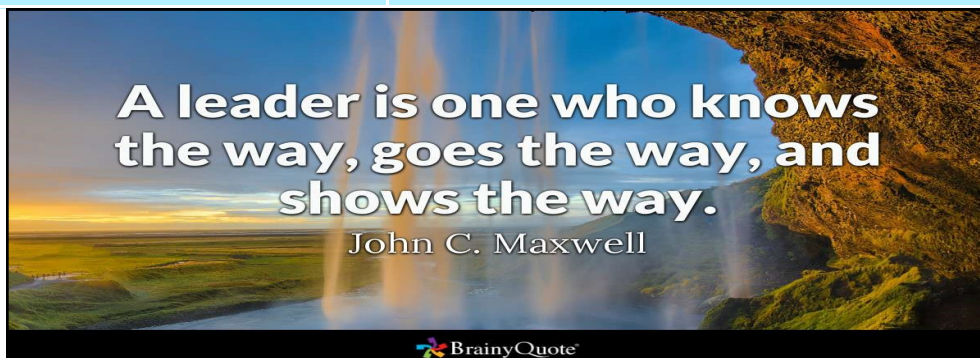

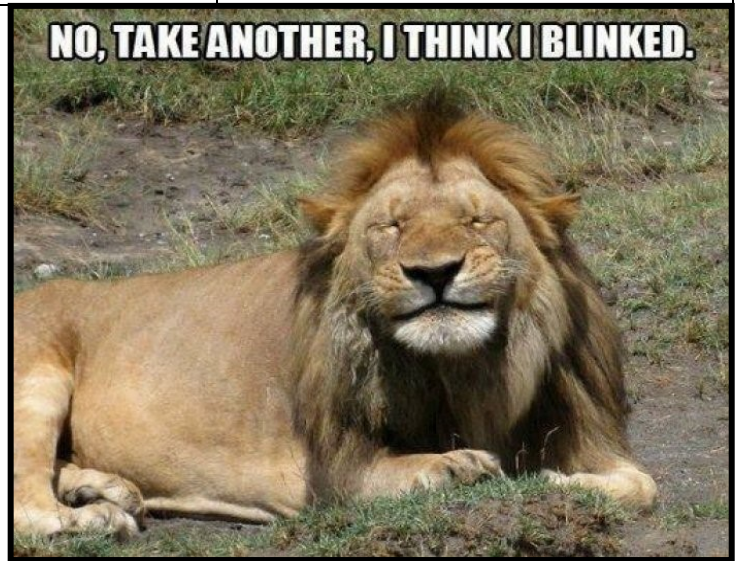
