

# **Hooks and Needles Program**

When you think of a group of prison inmates, does giving back to the community come to mind? How about crocheting? Well, I can tell you firsthand about a group of inmates in Folsom State Prison that do both and in many ways.

Folsom Lake Lions and the inmate group, Hooks and Needles, at Folsom State Prison have partnered to help others in our local, and not so local communities, for six years. The idea is simple, the Lions gather donations of yarn, the inmates crochet things with it and then the Lions distribute these items to non-profit groups supporting the homeless or underserved. We have provided items to 16 different non-profit groups.

Lions have delivered an average of 955 items a year of articles like hats, scarves, gloves, purses, blankets, booties, hair ties, and stuffed animals of all shapes and sizes, to those in need. Is the work creative, fun and of high quality? You bet it is, and the California State Fair Crochet judges agree. The men won three awards for items shown in 2017, their first time entering.

This project provides needed items and spreads a little toy, joy, and comfort to those involved all the way around, but wait, it gets even better.

As Lions, this project touches our hearts as we pass one gift made with care and love to someone who needs it, will use, and is thankful for it.

About once a year, we are invited to share the project results with the men in the group face to face. We tell the men of the places that have received their items and how thankful the individuals are that receive them. Maybe you can imagine our surprise and delight to hear that those men also elected to give a financial contribution to our club. I don't mind saying I was in tears. They told us to do something good with it. We will!

How is giving financial donations possible? Well, Folsom State Prison usually holds outside food sales four to five times a year. The inmates may purchase this food. Proceeds from these sales go to non-profits identified.



Over the past year donations have been presented to 916 Ink ( a nonprofit that works with at risk juveniles through writing), Vietnam Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Cancer Society, the Sacramento County Youth Activities League, Bridges to Life (victim's impact group), and Narcotics Anonymous as well as Folsom Lake Lions Club.

Want to see this groups work first hand? There will be several award winning items on display in the California Crafts area at the California State Fair this year!

Members of the Reveille Lions Club lost the 3,180-square-foot building at 417 Lincoln St., April 4, in an early morning blaze which crept up the northwest side of the structure and swept through the interior.

It's believed a transient dragged a mattress to the northwest side of the structure and started a small fire which got out of control. The fire was reported around 3:30 a.m.

The decision was reached following a Monday gathering of Reveille Lions members John Lynch, Larry Miller and Horgan with Coyle, local developers, architects and others in the building industry.

The fire burned through much of the roof but left a number of interior cross-beams intact. Also basically undamaged was the kitchen area as well as the restrooms.

While no one knows precisely how much it would cost to rebuild the structure, rough
