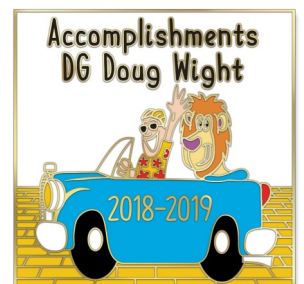

3 Myths People Actually Believe About Adult Literacy

Myth 1: *“I don't know anyone with a reading problem.”*

Fact: There are 36 million adults in the United States who can't read above a third-grade level. That means that 1 in 7 people have literacy issues. If you're surprised, you're not alone. Seventy-nine percent of adults said they don't know an adult with this issue.

Myth 2: *“Adults who attend literacy programs misbehaved in high school, were lazy, and generally didn't care about their education.”*

Fact: There are countless reasons why people attend literacy programs.

- They attended low-quality schools and poorly funded schools.
- They had to drop out of school due to events out of their control (such as needing to become the primary earner for the family).
- They struggled with undiagnosed learning impairments.
- They fell behind early and never caught up. “Sixty six percent of all U.S. fourth graders scored ‘below proficient’ on the 2013 National Assessment of Education Progress (NAEP) reading test.”

Myth 3: *“We have more important issues to worry about, like health care, unemployment, the economy, or who our next president will be.”*

Fact: People with low literacy skills are four times more likely to have poor health (two times higher than the national average). Those adults have a higher chance of having to go to the emergency room and that costs U.S. taxpayers between \$106 billion and \$238 billion each year!

Fact: Adults with low literacy levels are twice as likely to be unemployed. How do you fix it? If half of the dropouts from the class of 2008 had graduated, there would be an additional 30,000 new jobs! Imagine if that happened every year.

Fact: Americans with low literacy levels are less likely to be politically engaged or understand what is going on in politics. You want to get things done? Give people the tools to really understand the importance of the political process and we all might be a little less frustrated after every fourth November.

Lions can help -Contact your local elementary schools and libraries. Ask what you can do!!

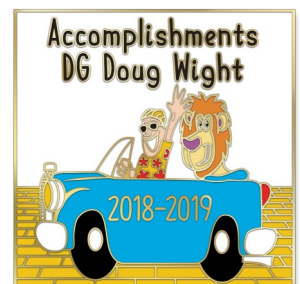

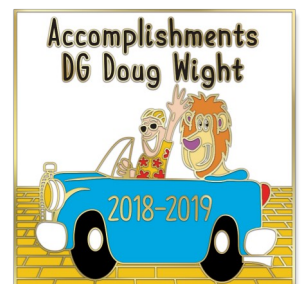

Global Service Team Message

This year Lions Clubs International has selected five areas of Community Service and Clubs worldwide are encouraged to participate in at least one event or project (or make a donation) in each area.

The five areas are:

1. **Childhood Cancer,**
2. **Diabetes Awareness,**
3. **Environment**
4. **Hunger**
5. **Vision**

Diabetes Awareness was selected by LCI as it is one of the fastest growing diseases in our world and it affects people of all ages, races and income levels. It is estimated 629 million people will have diabetes by 2045. Long term diabetes related health problems include damage to large and small blood vessels, which can lead to stroke and heart attack, and problems with the kidneys, eyes, feet and nerves.

As our District 4-C5 GST I have formed a Team to participate in the annual **Junior Diabetes Research Foundation (JDRF) One Walk on Sunday, October 7, 2018.**

We are Team **LIONS DISTRICT 4-C5**. The walk will take place at our State Capitol with registration at 8 am, the walk starts at 9 am. I hope many of our Lions, Lioness' and Leos sign up to participate in the walk and ask their family members, friends, coworkers and companies to make a pledge. I have set a goal of \$5,000 for our Team, and together I know we can raise this much, or more!

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) Report To the District Executive Board; Sept 30, 2018

As of today, August 30th, 2018, I submit the following report on the District actions in reference to the LCIF.

- ◆ Total donations reported on LCIF Report - \$4,910 (12.3% of District Goal \$40,000)
- ◆ Total number of clubs donated to LCIF: 17 of 53 (32%)
- ◆ Total number of Zones visited: 6 of 8 (75%)
- ◆ Total number of clubs visited: 6 of 53 (11.3%)
- ◆ Total number of clubs with a Club LCIF Coordinator: 34 of 53 (64.15%)

Currently, according to LCI (based on the PU 101 list of Club Officers for 2018-2019) as of August 30, 2018, 34 out of 53 Clubs has recorded their Club's LCIF Coordinator = 64.15%. Clubs who do not have a Club LCIF Coordinator must submit their names to LCI on a PU 101, the same form that you use to identify your new officers for the year. If the Club does not have a coordinator, LCIs Club's Constitution and By Laws under the Club Officers Responsibilities, the Immediate Past President becomes the Club's LCIF Coordinator.

Lion Vince Macias Goes to Washington

Higgins Diggins Lion and Korean Veteran Vince Macias was the guest speaker at a recent meeting of his club. Vince served in the Army from 1947 to 1953 and was stationed in Korea during the Conflict. While there, he was wounded and received a Purple Heart.



The topic of Vince's presentation was his June 2018 trip to Washington D.C. and Virginia, courtesy of the Bay Area Honor Flight program. Lion Vince signed up for this project a year and a half ago and received word that space was finally available for him. He had to wait his turn as WWII veterans had priority. Since there is a lot of walking involved, Vince's son escorted his dad and paid \$1,000 for the all inclusive trip. Vince's brother, Raymond Macias, also went on the trip as he too is a veteran of this time period.

The three Macias men joined 21 other veterans and a Honor Flight crew of three on a commercial flight from San Francisco to Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport for the three day trip. Vince said the reception from other travelers at both airports was overwhelming.



Onlookers clapped, cheered, and waived as the special group of veterans were guided on and off the planes. The crew of three accompanying the veterans included a registered nurse, but thankfully Vince said there were no incidents needing her services. Captain Carl Steward, U.S. Navy Retired was the person in charge of this specific trip for Honor Flight.

The group stayed at a Marriott hotel with deluxe accommodations. While visiting all the sights and monuments they traveled in a 40 passenger deluxe bus with a "Presidential Tour." Vince explained that means two police motorcycle escorts are in front of the bus and a patrol car is behind them, all with lights and sirens blaring!

When they encountered any traffic, the escorts drove around the tie up, driving in the lanes headed the opposite direction! They had a lot to do in just three days and didn't have time to sit in any traffic.

The veterans had a guided tour director who talked about everything they saw while driving and at the various sites in Virginia and DC. The trip included visits to Arlington National Cemetery, Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument, the Naval Museum and war memorials that honored those who served in World War II, the Korean Conflict, Viet Nam, Marine Air Force, and the Women's Auxiliary.

Vince explained how poignant the Korean War Memorial was, there is a long smooth wall and as one walks along the wall faces are reflected back at the observer and they seem to follow you. Vince said you can not see them when standing and looking directly at the wall. He said it was amazing.



The monument also has an area where statues in uniforms and capes depict the military on patrol in tall vegetation, just as he remembered from his days of serving in Korea.

While on the various tours, Vince said they encountered school children who were also on tour. The veterans were greeted warmly by the children and adult escorts with many asking to have photos taken with the vets. One little girl thanked Vince for his service and gave him a pin of Korea that was purchased at a gift shop.

Upon their return from Washington D.C., each veteran was presented with a beautiful handmade quilt made by volunteers of Quilts of Honor. This non-profit was founded in 2009 by Californian, Gail Belmont, and gives special thanks to those who have served in harms way by presenting them with a quilt.

Lion Vince was especially impressed with one fellow veteran on their trip. She served as a nurse in World War II and was very spry for a 100 year old!

They have recently started offering space to Viet Nam veterans. The trip is free to all those who qualify. Any veterans needing assistance from a relative or friend must pay a nominal fee.

The Honor Flight program has chapters all over the country and depends on donations from organizations and corporations to make these special trips possible.

Lion Vince knows this firsthand now, as he shared with his fellow Lions that this was a once in a lifetime trip that he will always remember.



They grant requests based on the seniority of veterans and those who may be terminally ill. As their website states:

“An Honor Flight Tour is simply a small token of our appreciation for everything they’ve done. Throughout their Honor Flight Network tour, the Veterans are thanked, recognized and admired for their service. They come home personally knowing how much their

country loves them and respects them. Veterans will never forget this gratitude and adoration.”

Food Basket Items for Needy

The holiday season will be here before you know it and many Lions Clubs put together food baskets or donate to local food banks during this season. It's not too early to start planning for your holiday food basket giveaways or food donations!!

When putting together food baskets for the needy, you need to keep in mind that everything should be nonperishable. The organization that will distribute the baskets likely won't accept fresh fruit, vegetables and baked goods. Make sure that nonperishables aren't expired or about to expire -- and that the packaging is sealed. Purchase food with the full intention of putting it in the gift basket.



Canned vegetables are always welcome, both for holiday baskets and everyday donations. Basics like corn, peas, green beans and mixed vegetables are good choices, as are diced tomatoes and tomato sauce to serve with pasta. Include canned peaches, pineapple, fruit cocktail and canned juices as well.

Many nonperishable, high-protein foods come in cans -- like tuna, salmon, sardines, shrimp, chicken, chili, baked beans, red beans, soups and stews. Peanut butter -- another nonperishable protein food -- makes a healthy addition to a food basket for the needy.

Inexpensive dry foods such as rice and pasta can go a long way, so don't overlook them. Add several boxes of macaroni and cheese dinners, spaghetti and flavored rice mixes. Hot breakfast cereals such as oatmeal, grits and porridge-type foods are healthy nonperishables. Dry cereals that you can eat with or without milk are good choices, especially if you're donating to a family with kids. Look for complete pancake mixes that require only water -- add a bottle of maple syrup.

While staples are a must in a gift basket for the needy, don't forget to add some special treats. Add holiday items such as canned cranberry sauce, stuffing mix and pumpkin pie filling. Nonperishable sweets such as chocolate, hard candy and cookies are surprises that will be appreciated. Look for healthy nonperishable snacks like nuts, dried fruit such as raisins and apricots, banana chips and popcorn if they're in sealed packaging.

If you know there's a baby in the family, be sure to include some jarred baby food and powdered or canned formula. Finger foods for babies such as O-shaped oat cereal and teething biscuits are also good additions.
