





Teach an Adult to Read...Inspire The World to Change

Adults across the country need help to gain basic literacy, math, or computer skills that will enable them to succeed as workers, parents, and community citizens. When adults reach their educational goals, their families and communi- Who can volunteer? ties grow stronger.

You can bring optimism and enthusiasm, create positive energy, and share diverse perspectives that lead to enhanced learning outcomes for students. Become an adult literacy volunteer and help empower an adult learner to reach their full potential to participate more fully in society.

Who are adult learners?

Adult students who attend classes are over the age of 16, represent all races and genders, and come from all economic and social backgrounds. They may have completed high school or left before graduation, but did not acquire the literacy and comprehension skills they need to be successful.

- Basic Adult Literacy: Tutors work with adults who wish to improve reading and writing skills.
- High School Equivalency (HSE): Tutors help adult students prepare for their HSE exams by tutoring them in one or more subject areas including math, science, social studies, writing, or reading.
- English Language Learning (ELL): Tutors help students learn to speak, read, and write in basic English..
- Math: Tutors teach math skills, ranging from basic numeracy to algebra and geometry.
- College and Career Readiness: Tutors help adults who have earned their high school diploma or equivalency degree prepare for college or brush up on their reading, writing, or math skills to gain employment and job search skills.
- Citizenship: Tutors help refugees and immigrants learn English, history, and civics in order to pass the U.S. naturalization test.

Digital Literacy: Tutors help adults gain the basic computer skills they need to survive and thrive in today's digital world and workplace.

When it comes to volunteering, passion and positivity are the main requirements. Tutors should be passionate about sharing their skills and knowledge with adults who want to improve their reading, writing, and technology skills. Anyone with reasonable levels of reading and numeracy can get involved. Consistency is important to learners, so you will need to commit to a regular weekly time slot.

Successful adult literacy volunteers have the following characteristics:

- Dependability, promptness, patience, flexibility, and friendliness
- Interest in diverse cultures and stories
- Ability to relate to people from many backgrounds
- A willingness to provide respectful and relevant instructional content
- A willingness to work with and take direction from program staff
- Interest in serving the community
- Ability to speak, read, and write English fluently

What is the time commitment involved?

Most literacy programs suggest that a new tutor meet with their adult learner at least once a week for 1½ to 2 hours. Maintaining this time commitment is important in helping the student acquire his or her skills as quickly as possible. Tutoring may be scheduled for any day or time agreeable to both the Tutor and Student. Most programs ask tutors to consider making a commitment for at least 6 months.

Do I need training?

Yes! It's fun, you'll learn a lot, and you'll become a more confident and effective volunteer. It is a great service to your learners to be better trained to tutor them.

Do I have to be an expert in English grammar?

No. Anyone with basic reading and writing skills can become a volunteer. Resources are available to you to sharpen your skills.

Where do lessons take place?

Tutoring is conducted in libraries or in other public locations convenient to both the learner and the tutor.

How do I get started?

Rogalski were in charge of arranging the event.


During the ceremony, a special Broken Quill pin was presented to Lions Dennis and Kitty, and to symbolize their

California Lions Foundation-New Website



A new, additional website (www.californialions.org) has been developed to showcase the Lions of California specifically to non-Lions. The website describes the Lions Clubs of California, as who we are, by what we do, promoting: City of Hope, Lions in Sight, Lions Eye foundation, California Lions Foundation, Lions Clubs International Foundation, Lions Float, Inc., and similar partner associations. Note that acronyms such as Multiple District 4 (MD-4) are not present in this public targeted Lions Clubs promotional effort and that the text and photos are intended to appeal emotionally to a younger audience.

The MD4 Council of Governors recently authorized that the new website be launched, as-is, to the 20,000 Lions of California. As a measure

of success, we will monitor whether additional not-for-profit and for-profit business partners will request inclusion on our website going forward. We will also track the quantity and track the number of website hits and how long users spend on the site and on each page. 

Lions Club International Foundation - Campaign 100 - Empowering Service

Goals – How do we establish our goals for our Clubs and District? How do we define our minimum target?

What is the Campaign's goal?

The overall worldwide goal for Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) is \$300 million by June 20, 2021.

Why do we need to have goals?

Setting goals at every level give our leaders specific and manageable expectations for their region's (club's) participation and support of LCIF: Campaign 100.

Who sets our goals and how will they be set?

District goals are set by the District Governor, Executive Cabinet and the District LCIF Coordinator. Club goals are set by a Club's Board of Directors. Goals are set by multiplying your total number of membership versus an amount established by the Executive Board or Club Board of Directors.

Example: Club XYZ has 25 members, multiplied by \$150 (for each member) would equal \$3,750. This amount would then be divided by three for a yearly target of \$1,250 per year. If you take this target and divide by 12 months it would equals \$104.16 each month for a club.


As a leader, you know your club's best. You will have ownership over your goals and your plans to achieve your goal. Each Club starts with a minimum fundraising target. You may adjust your goal up from the minimum target.

To help your club members reach the total club's goal, you would have to determine your fundraising project. Your annual fundraising goal along with sup-

port from your club members, support from non-lions and businesses will assist you in reaching your Clubs goal for the year.

Type of Fundraising Project:



packing area.

The mission is to pack meals, a meal feeds a family of four and includes soy, rice, dried vegetables and vitamins. It's quite a process with a team of about eight, scooping, bagging, weighing, sealing and packing the meals into cases. The music blasts to keep you energy level high.

On our work day, in just two hours, our team of 409 volunteers packed over 98,500 meals, or enough for 269 children to get one warm meal every day for a year. Amazing!




