We all assisted with off-loading the boxes and then spent the afternoon handing out meals and supplies

to those who lost everything in Paradise during the Camp Fire. Families arrived in their cars during the afternoon and we filled up any spare space left in their cars with our boxes of food and supplies. They were all so grateful for all that Lions were doing that it brought tears to many of them as well as us. Inside of the center there was even more available to them including Christmas toys and many other things people needed to get through the days ahead.



#### Campaign 100 – Empowering Service-Status of District 4-C5

Hello District 4-C5 Lions,

We are almost halfway through our year and we have donated just over \$20,000 (December 2018) to Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). This give us a 52.24% of our District Goal of \$40,000. This month joining the \$1,000 club is Meadow Vista Lions Club.

Several of our clubs has a Melvin Jones Fellowship in their back pocket, some of our clubs are very close to having a Melvin Jones Fellowship within their grasp for this year and some are half way to donating the amount needed to receive a Melvin Jones Fellowship. It would be great if a club wanted to have a MJF presented to one of their members during the MD4 State Lions Convention on February 10th during the MJF Breakfast. In order to do this, the club would need to identify the member as soon as they can so that LCIF can process the award for the MJF Breakfast.

I am still visiting clubs within our District and so far I have matched 28 of the 32 clubs with their donation of \$20 to LCIF. By the time you have a chance to read this article, I will have matched every club that donated to LCIF. Remember, I am only matching the first \$20.

We have 19 clubs that has donated \$250 or more since the first of the year, with eleven clubs donating \$1,000 or more to LCIF.

We have had some great fundraising and support projects so far this year. We started off with Citrus Heights Lions Club with the assistance of six other clubs donating \$2,790 for LCIF Disaster Relief for Puerto Rico. #### Reasons Why Loomis Lions Should Recruit Seniors

The Loomis Lions Club members have Loomis Lions January been within the senior age group for many years. They share this distinction with the vast majority of Lions Clubs in California's MD-4 and across the United States.

> Perhaps a club composed mainly of seniors (men and women over 50) is as it should be for the Loomis club. Under 50 year olds are often too busy building lives, working, raising young children, with little time to devote to club projects.

Those under 50 sometimes lack the pocket cash to help with club's community and international efforts.

Speaking of cash, Today's Senior magazine described the senior age group, those over 50 years of age, in ways many Lions members have never considered.

In promoting the magazine's advertising, it's editor noted that seniors

control 70% of all the wealth in the United States.

Seniors, it was noted, bring in \$2 trillion in annual income, have more disposable income than other age groups, and are more settled in actual permanent homes; they stay within the community.

Being seniors, the magazine described them as the leader age group in the purchase of new cars, heavy spenders on lengthy vacations, and spend more on groceries, health products, and leisure.

In short, to the degree Loomis Lions members fit within the senior age group. it can be argued that past member recruiting has been properly focused.

Recruiting seniors has never been a problem. Retaining those recruited, however, remains for Loomis and elsewhere an ongoing issue.




