

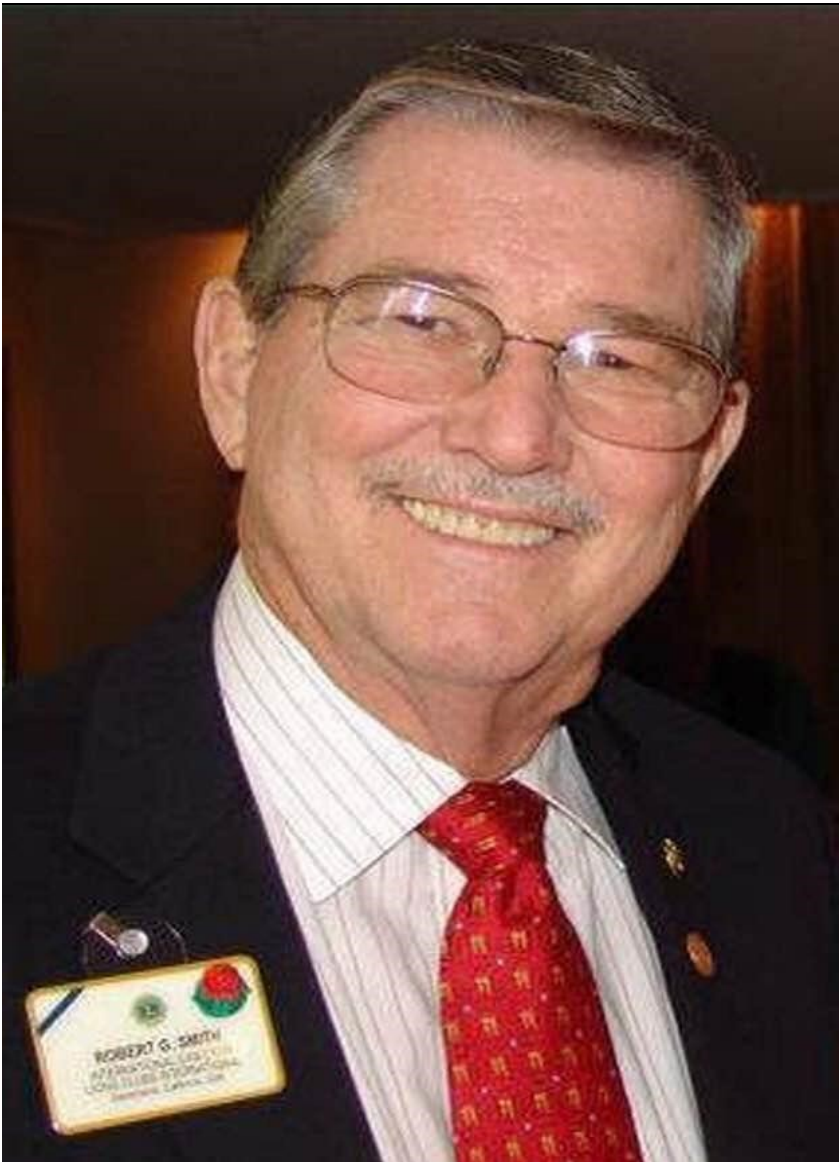

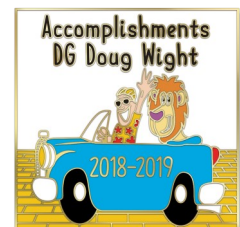

In Remembrance-Past International Director Robert "Bob" Smith

On rare occasion, a Lions member surfaces with the qualities of becoming the organization's global Chief Executive. Adding to the rarity of reaching that exalted level is being closely related to a former International President from the same high school in central California. Had a fatal disease not become known when the decision to campaign or not had to be made for the presidential post, Past International Director (PID) Bob Smith may have become Lions International President. To have won meant PID Bob had followed closely the Lions career path of his older high school friend, International President Kay K. Fukushima.

PID Bob Smith was born October 6, 1941. Bob grew up during the 40-50's and worked in his dad's garage. He developed a strong work ethic and was always willing to take on new opportunities. While still in his teens, he lettered in football, baseball and track. Bob discovered he could perform on the school stage in both junior and senior performances. It was during his role as Walter Denton in the play, *Our Miss Brooks*, that Bob discovered kissing. He welcomed the new challenge several times before graduating from Courtland Joint Union High School in 1959.

Like so many young men completing high school and eager to face the world, Bob liked the US Army and decided to enlist. He told his family his service plans and they gave him their support. His basic training was at Fort Ord in California followed by special training as an Armored Recovery specialist.

On Bob's graduation as a specialist, he was ordered to Stuttgart Germany and stationed with the 585 Ordinance Armored Recovery Unit between the years 1959 and 1962. On his return home from Europe, he was honorably discharged in 1962.

PID Bob's first need when home again was finding employment. He applied with the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department and was accepted. He managed to squeeze education in with his patrol duties. He graduated from Sierra College and then attended Sacramento State College taking courses to aid his enforcement career.

Bob's patrol experiences, plus steadfast educational goals and accomplishments brought him to the attention of the County Sheriff who gave him a special 3-year undercover management assignment. The county was experiencing runaway stolen goods and theft rings and Bob was asked to go 'underground' and bring the crimes to a halt. In short order, the always neatly dressed and well-groomed Bob Smith became sloppy. He was seen in ill-fitting clothes with long and unruly hair. Even his family wondered about the obvious changes in their devoted and loving father. They also knew the changes fit his assignment and were temporary.

Bob's leadership faced many challenges in the 32 years as a deputy sheriff. He rose through the ranks from patrolman on duty to Sergeant, then Detective. His leadership, knowledge and personal integrity served him well as a specialist in home invasions, burglary, robbery, hostages, and homicide investigations.

A high point in his career occurred in April 1991. Then detective Smith assisted with the now famous Sacramento Good Guys robbery where his skills with negotiating led to the successful safe release of a hostage-held child.

In January 1995, Sheriff Glen Craig honored Detective Robert G. Smith for his dedicated 30-year service with the Sacramento Sheriff's department. The Sheriff noted that Smith's tour with the department included being shot at and even stabbed.

Bob's love for his beautiful wife, Vickie, was documented one more time when the Sheriff inquired what he desired as a gift on his retirement. Bob said he didn't want anything for himself, but a necklace for his wife would suffice; the necklace, Bob thought would be his thanks to Vickie for her support while he served the community. He had married Vickie in January 1977.

Bob became a Lion with Sacramento Embarcadero in 1982. Vickie joined in 2002 with Folsom Lake Lions. Bob made his presence well known in Lions from day one. He worked his way through all club offices and his club supported him for the higher division role of first Vice District Governor. He was elected and was elected again to District 4-C5 District Governor the following year, 1999-2000.

Bob's Embarcadero Lions Club encouraged him to utilize his leadership skills once again. He agreed, resulting in him being elected to the Multiple District Council chair in 2000-2001.

A period of nearly 10 years passed doing club business before he decided to campaign for the global role of Lions International Director. He was easily elected and served for 2 years, 2010-2012.

Vickie, and daughter Jenn, were at Bob's bedside when he closed his eyes for the last time in the early morning of March 30th. His last days had been busy for him as his many friends made their way to his bedside to give encouragement and their affection.

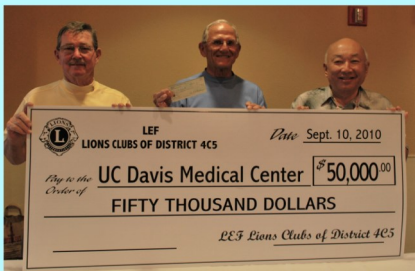
PID Bob was, for all who knew him, a rare man worthy of long-term friendship. His accomplishments were beyond count and for those of us attempting to do good through our Lionism, he was our mentor and confidant. He was the ideal role model as son, husband and father here on earth.

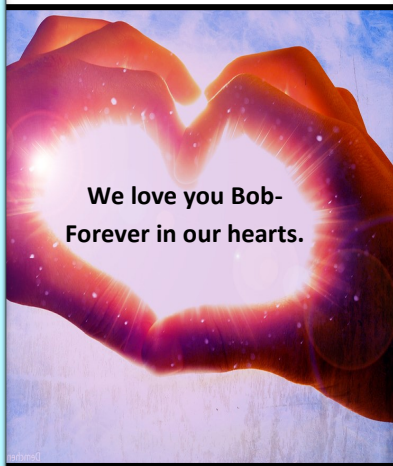

Lions Donate \$150K to Society for the Blind

Society for the Blind has received a donation of \$150,000 from the Northern California Lions Sight Association (NCLSA) and the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) to support the expansion of the low vision clinic and training space at Society for the Blind.

The Northern California Lions Sight Association donated \$75,000 to purchase equipment and vision testing devices for the Low Vision Clinic. NCLSA then secured a matching grant of \$75,000 from LCIF to be used towards the expansion of the training center including an indoor orientation and mobility course.

“Lions Clubs across the world have a long, steadfast history of supporting organizations that help people with vision loss, so we are deeply honored that the Lions chose to invest in Society for the Blind here in Sacramento,” said Shari Roeseler, Executive Director, Society for the Blind and member of the Senator Lions Club. “The generosity of both the regional and international Lions means that more people across California who are experiencing vision loss will have access to critical assessment and treatment.”

As the only comprehensive vision rehabilitation center in the Sacramento region, Society for the Blind is a critical resource for people who are blind or have low vision. The Low Vision Clinic provides eye care, vision rehabilitation, and training on assistive devices at its locations in Sacramento and Roseville. The expansion at Society for the Blind will add 5,000 square feet of multi-purpose space, a conference room, music room and new teaching kitchen

for the Senior Program in addition to the orientation and mobility course.

Lions District 4-C5 District Governor Douglas Wight stated, NCLSA’s Constitution and Bylaws provides, *“The purpose of NCLSA is to further the principles of Lionism and enlarge upon the international concept of bringing greater stability and independence to*

those individuals with visual and other deficiencies, by providing and/or supporting services and programs of organizations to perpetuate such purpose.”

When Executive Director Shari Roeseler reached out to the Board of Directors of NCLSA announcing their plan to expand their Low Vision Clinic, the

NCLSA Board recognized Society’s fit into that single paragraph. NCLSA saw the need to assist Society for the Blind by making the donation and obtaining a matching grant from LCIF, the funding arm of Lions Clubs International. LCIF also saw the need and approved the matching grant. Wight further stated that members of District 4-C5 Lions are looking forward to the completion of the project.

Lions Clubs International is the largest service organization in the world with more than 1.4 million members. The organization’s mission is to support the efforts of Lions clubs and partners in serving communities locally and globally, giving hope and impacting lives through humanitarian service projects and grants. Visionary Report

Lion Bing Ventura **Board of Director, Washoe Region**

The Northern California Lions Sight Association (NCLSA) is a non-profit corporation whose members are all Lions in good standing from Lions Clubs of District 4-C5. The Board of Directors are composed of four elected Directors from each of our four Regions, along with our Immediate Past NCLSA President, the current District Governor and our Immediate Past District Governor. The NCLSA meets at the Sacramento Café and Brew, 925 3rd Street, Sacramento, CA, 95814, the first Wednesday of every month at 7:00 p.m. All Lions are welcome to attend the meetings. If you are interested in serving on the NCLSA Board, please contact a current Director. Our website is www.nclsa.com. Clubs are encouraged to become a VIP Member and please remember to pay their VIP dues.

Vision Is Possible (VIP) – In our last meeting in March 6, 2019, two patients were presented to the Board of Directors for approval to shoulder expenses incurred and future expenses related to their conditions. Both have cataracts that would require surgeries and ocular implantation. Both patients were referred to NCLSA by Roseville Sunrise Lions Club.

On March 6, 2019, Dr. Ernie Takahashi conducted a short training on Common Eye Conditions. This was followed by a training on PlusOptix screening device in preparation for a vision screening event at ABC School for Autism which, was held on March 25, 2019. An advance party was sent to the school a week before the scheduled day to observe and have additional briefing from ABC school staff. A team of NCLSA Board headed by PCC Derek Ledda and Lion Yvette Nonato conducted the vision screening of 47 students and out of these students 14 were referred to an eye specialist for possible eye problems which, if not treated at an early age may lead to more permanent eye conditions.

A check of \$150,000.00 from NCLSA was presented to the Executive Director of the Society for the Blind at the lobby

of their facility in downtown Sacramento. A few NCLSA Board members were present headed by DG Doug Wight. The money will be used as a additional funding for their expansion project for Low Vision Clinic at their downtown Sacramento facility which, will cover more counties than currently being served. The amount includes a matching grant of \$75,000 .00 from LCIF which was recently approved.

Vision Screening Unit – Embarcadero Lions Club has reserved the VSU and PlusOptix for this coming Saturday event, April 6, 2019, during the Parkinson Walk. Two (2) outings are scheduled for the month of May, one reserved by Fair Oaks Lions Club and the other by Woodland Host Lions Club for their Special Kids Day.

If you are interested in reserving the Sight Van, mail the reservation form and check to NCLSA Vision Screening Unit, c/o Joe Bowers. His telephone number is 916-267-8504 and email address is evoc504@gmail.com. The Reservation Form is available on NCLSA website at www.nclsa.com under Vision Screening. Please send check and reservation form together. Do not hesitate in reserving the van. The calendar is getting full. VIP clubs may reserve the unit 12 months in advance.

Also, the PlusOptix screening devices are available to all clubs at District 4-C5 at \$25.00 per day. For additional information, please contact any NCLSA Director and/or your Region Chair to reserve the unit.

Currently, NCLSA is seeking additional QUALIFIED DRIVERS for the Vision Screening Unit. These drivers need to have experience driving large recreational vehicles; school buses; and/or tractor-trailer type trucks. Fundraisers for NCLSA – There are new NCLSA Pins which feature the Vision Screening Unit (VSU) for sale at \$5.00 each. Additionally, they are still selling old VSU pins. If you buy a set of 2 pins (old and new VSU pins) they are \$8.00 for a pair. Please contact one of the Directors if you desire to purchase a pin.

Lion Account Information

On March 27, all the Lions digital applications will be grouped into a single account, which will be called your “**Lion Account.**” This account will use a single, universal login system. Instead of using different credentials to login to different applications, Lions Clubs International (LCI) will use one User ID and Password to access them all (MyLion, MyLCI, Shop and upcoming applications).

For MyLion users—you’re all set! Your MyLion credentials will work for your Lion Account.

For MyLCI users—you will be asked to create a Lion Account *if you have not already registered on MyLion.*

LCI evaluated alternatives for this transition, such as using existing MyLCI login information as the universal login. Unfortunately, that approach has some technical limitations.

If you choose MyLion, it will open your club and you can see your reports, if you are a Secretary or President. You can post your future projects and who to invite.

Big Fire Zone, and McDonald's Charity House.



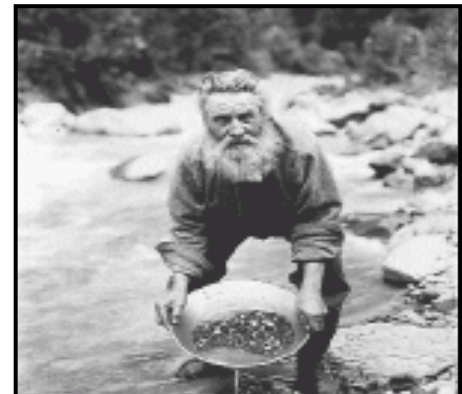
