

Members of Grass Valley's Foothill Lions Club visited the Project for the Visually Impaired at Folsom State Prison.

They met inmates, many of whom are serving life sentences, who are doing well while doing time.

"It's an amazing program," said Foothill Lions Club Past President Arnie Romanello, who has toured the prison eight times and serves on the Board of Directors for the project.

Over the past three decades, inmates working in the Folsom Project for the Visually Impaired have processed more than 4 million eyeglasses.

Glasses are donated at Lions Club drop boxes across the state and then delivered to the prison. There, inmates use special equipment to determine the eye doctor's prescription for each pair of glasses, members Sandy Woods, George Woods, Arnie Romanello, Al which details how the lenses help correct near-sightedness, far- Eagle, Linda Stevens, Susan Healy-Harman and Patrick Eidman. sightedness, or perhaps a stigmatism. It's a precise procedure that Lorraine Jewett helps ensure the correct glasses go to the people who need them.

The glasses are cleaned, repaired, and redistributed around the world, including countries such as Uganda, Bangladesh and Vietnam.

Inmates also record books on tape and CD, input closed captioning, and create texts in Braille. Literary books, academic books and even music books are translated into Braille. Prisoners also make visual Braille evacuation maps for buildings.

Lions Clubs across the state raise money to fund reading rooms, equipment and other project needs at Folsom Prison.

Don Ring of Wilton led the prison tour. He started the prison vision project in 1989 while serving as Lions Club District Governor. Another member of his Folsom Lions Club, who was then an associate warden at Folsom Prison, suggested the idea.

"The inmates in our program must be able to read, write and type," said Ring. "There are no sex offenders. They must exhibit good behavior. Any prospective worker must be approved by existing members of the team."

PROGRAM START

The project started with inmates recording books on tape for the visually impaired. As it evolved, the program began to benefit inmates whose new job skills were helpful at parole board hearings.

"In fact, they have jobs waiting for them when they are paroled," said Ring.

In the early days of the project, inmate William Cloud recorded school books for a young girl named Amelia Diaz. The second grader wrote back in Braille to Cloud, who was serving a life sentence. The inmate asked to learn Braille, and eventually became an expert. Continued on next page

Cloud was later pardoned by the governor, worked for a blind judge in San Diego County, and now heads a lucrative bottled drink company in Arkansas, according to Ring.

"The whole thinking process changes for the inmates involved," Ring said. Lions Clubs have actively supported sight-improvement programs for nearly a century.

In 1925, author and activist Helen Keller, who was deaf and blind, challenged Lions Clubs to become "Knights of the Blind."

Today, Lions Clubs fund vision testing in schools, professional eye exams and glaucoma screening, guide dog programs, homes for the blind, and the purchase of special eye equipment for hospitals and clinics.

Built in 1880, Folsom State Prison, is one of California's oldest prisons. There are 4,500 male inmates and 2,500 guards and 600 female inmates. Among the men, 22 work in the vision project and another 160 produce 50,000 license plates each day at a different manufacturing facility within the prison. Many of the women, housed in a separate section of the prison, raise guide dogs for the blind.

As Lions Club visitors stopped to confer with inmates during their tour of the vision project, nearly every prisoner thanked them for their support.

into the prison, but Lions members left with special images hand-created by inmates. Each visitor was asked already-lengthy Children's Scholastic Dictionary comprises to choose several pieces of Braille art made with a Perkins Brailler. The drawings included puppies, sea creatures, and more.

CHANGE

In 2009, the Lions Clubs project became an official part of the California Prison Industry Authority (CalPIA). The authority provides productive and rewarding work assignments for approximately 8,000 offenders in California

each year in a variety of service, manufacturing, and agricultural industries.

The authority is a self-supporting, customer-centered business that receives no funding from the state budget. CalPIA participants are returned to prison, on average, up to 38%: less often than offenders released from the state prison system's general population.

Recidivism within the Lions Folsom Project for the Visually Impaired is even lower: a total of only 2-3%, according to Romanello.

The respectful, non-threatening demeanor of the prisoners surprised some of the Lions guests.

"Everyone reveres Don so much that we felt welcome and safe everywhere we went, even when there were no

> guards obviously present," said Foothill Lions Club Treasurer Sandy Woods.

> Lions Club visitors wondered about the need to avoid eve contact as they toured the license plate-making section. They needn't have worried. One woman was even gifted earplugs by an inmate.

> "I have a hearing sensitivity problem," said Susan Healy-"and one of the Harman, inmates noticed me walking

through the area with fingers in my ears. He gave me a

set of brand new ear plugs." Visitors are not allowed to take cameras or cell phones It takes years for prisoners to master the tasks demanded of them within the vision project. For example, the 53 volumes in Braille.

> Transcription into Braille is a labor-intensive endeavor, but a rewarding one.

> "This is an opportunity to earn a career," said one of the inmates, "and give back to society. We are men who have had a change of heart."

At the Cabinet Meeting on August 24th, a Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Manager, Wendy Lang, was our guest speaker prior to the forums. Lang described what the difference is between a regular California driver license and a Real-ID driver license.

Starting October 1, 2020, you will need to show federallycompliant (REAL-ID) identification in order to board a domestic flight within the U.S. and enter secure federal facilities, such as military bases, federal courthouses, and other secure federal locations.

WHAT IS A REAL-ID?

The federal REAL ID Act places new rules on which forms of identification may be used to board flights within the U.S. and enter secure federal facilities, such as military bases, federal courthouses, and other federal facilities. A California issued driver license or identification card that meets these new requirements is called a REAL ID and is cation should be completed, https://www.dmv.ca.gov/ marked with a gold bear and star.

Getting a REAL ID requires proofs of identity, Social Security number (if eligible) and residency, and a trip to a DMV office.

DO I NEED A REAL-ID?

No. A REAL ID driver license or identification card is optional.

REAL ID is needed if:

- 1. You wish to continue to use your driver license or U.S.
- 2. Enter secure federal facilities.

If you want to continue to use a U.S. passport, U.S. passport card, military ID, enhanced driver license, or other federally accepted identification to do those things, you do not need to get a REAL ID; however, it is recommended.

Visit www.dmv.ca.gov to find out more information. The REAL-ID website walks you through everything you need to prepare for obtaining a REAL-ID. Also, the online appli-

ONLINE APPOINTMENTS

Online appointments with DMV book quickly. It sometimes takes up to 90-days to obtain one, so don't wait, get one now! If you are due for renewal, try booking your appointment as soon as you get your renewal notice (or sooner if possible). Go to www.dmv.ca.gov to make one.

> If I need to get a duplicate REAL ID or when I renew my REAL ID, will I have to show my documents again?

No. Once the REAL ID is issued, documents will not need to be presented again. The only exception for this would be those applicants with Limited Term Legal Presence. The department will need to verify new identity documents each time they expire.

Why can't I use my permanent Military ID as an identity document?

Military ID cards are not listed on the federally approved Identity documents list for REAL ID.



Global Membership Team (GMT) Report

I am working with the club's President, Secretary, and Membership Chair to work on a program for one of their meeting to talk with them about how to attract new members. Ocular Migraines

"Most people are familiar with classic migraines, but ocular migraines are less well-known. An ocular migraine is a condition where the blood vessels in the optic nerve at the back of your eye tighten and swell, resulting in various visual distortions. While classic migraines usually result in intense headaches, sensitivity to light and loud sounds, or nausea, ocular migraines are not necessarily painful.

If you've never had an ocular migraine before, your first one can be frightening. Although sudden vision impairment can also be a sign of stroke or carotid artery disease, true ocular migraines don't actually indicate or cause any damage to your eyes or brain. You can often tell if you're about to experience one if you start to lose your ability to see the focal point of your vision. For example, you might be able to see a street sign but not be able to read the text on it. The onset of an ocular migraine can last anywhere from about three to eight minutes.

The aura stage, or "light show" as many sufferers call it, usually follows the onset. This stage affects more than just the focal point of your vision. You might see something that looks like a lightning bolt moving about in your peripheral and central vision. Some people compare this stage of an ocular migraine to looking through a kaleidoscope. Everything appears very fluid, and you

can become quite disoriented. Retinal detachment displays similar "light shows," only these types of light flashes typically last for only a split second and come in flurry form, rather than kaleidoscope form.

The causes of ocular migraines differ from person to person, and sometimes they are just unexplainable. Some say chocolate or caffeine triggers them, while others believe stress and certain medications are a factor. Still, other sufferers say they experience ocular migraines randomly. Once an ocular migraine has begun, it's difficult and sometimes impossible to stop. The migraine aura typically disappears in about 30 to 40 minutes, and headaches (if you get them) come about 10 to 15 minutes after the aura stage.

My advice to those who suffer from ocular migraines is to just relax and enjoy the show. The more relaxed you can be, the better the odds are that you won't bring on a stress-induced headache—a common side effect—when the show is over.


