Recently, Governor Gavin Newsom laid out a four-stage plan to reopen businesses, schools, and entertainment events.

A drive-by distribution system kept everyone well within the social distancing guidelines. This small effort proved to be a major morale boost for the families who received the "Care Packages". We were inspired by the appreciation and exchange of kindnesses demonstrated by all during our dinner distribution.

What this shelter in place mandate has given us is an opportunity to review what is important and how to best utilize our efforts for the coming year. Simple tasks take a bit of organizing and contemplation prior to execution. The rewards can be surprisingly optimistic.

Being positive has been part of me since as far back as I can remember. I am an incurable optimist, seeing the cup halffull, I tend to weigh everything seeing the downside first then search out the positive. The truly positive person will keep

Lion Lucinda Talkington, Reveille Lions, was one of the 2,500 passengers caught in an adventure at sea or some might say nightmare of a lifetime. This is her story.....

Seniors over 70 apparently love to go on cruises. In fact, approximately two-thirds of the 2,500 passengers on the Grand Princess were seniors. My travelling companions and I will be 80 next year. Etsy, my 7 -year-old guide dog, has cruised with us for five years. We really enjoyed sailing from the berth in San Francisco which is so close in miles to our homes.

This year the trip on the Princess was leaving February 21st for Hawaii. Preparing for that trip was quite time consuming as to logistics for Etsy. For months, I worked on obtaining Etsy's paperwork because the state of Hawaii is very strict about the health of any type of animal, especially dogs, going to the Islands. The Islands are void of rabid animals and they intend to keep it that way. Eventually, Etsy had every certificate needed to certify her good health, background and vaccinations were up to date. All went well. However, who would of thought that Etsy would end up being the center of attention during forthcoming adventures at sea.

ADVENTURES AT SEA

Starting on a cruise is always exciting with expectations of food, exploring, entertainment, friends, activities and no phones. Finding Etsy's potty was my first task. The favorite question asked of me from other cruisers was "Where does your dog go to the bathroom?" Once her needs were met, my friends and I were off to the formal dining room. It was in this nightly dining room where we met Maya, our fun and gracious waitress. Maya took charge of our table. On the third night we found out she was quite ill and most likely had a virus. What kind? We didn't know. Four days later all 2,500 of us were quarantined in our rooms!

I will always remember the night the captain announced that all activities would immediately cease and everyone was ordered to wear a mask when answering the cabin door. We were also warned not to leave our cabin for any reason. Meals were delivered and placed on the floor in the corridor by stewards who were wearing masks and white hazard suits. Stewards nor housekeeping were not permitted to enter our rooms and no passengers could visit each other. Additionally, we had to skip going to Mexico, the last leg of our trip, and go directly back to San Francisco.

Swinging emotions ranged from fear to bewilderment to boredom, to excitement to deep sadness about those who were ill on board and those isolated in the inside staterooms with no windows. Yes, I was fortunate to have a balcony and next door to my extended family. We had jimmied the balcony connecting door so Etsy and I could pass through to their stateroom. The sentries watched our front doors.

When the planes and helicopters circled the ship in the middle of the ocean, all passengers were told to close their balcony doors and curtains. We were told that the ill passengers were going to be taken off and Coronavirus tests would be left. Only 60 tests were left for 2,500 people. We were asked continuously if we had fevers, headaches, and other symptoms. That was scary. Did not sleep well.

The captain came on the overhead speakers about five times a day giving us information. Unfortunately, or fortunately, the TV news channels were following us and provided us with information. So much information was contradictory to what the captain shared with us. The captain always apologized for late or erroneous information.

GOLDEN GATE BRIDGE

When we were 50 miles from the California coastline, Governor Newsom announced that we could not land until we all had a Covid-19 test. That did not happen. For four days we travelled up and

down the coast of California and finally we were allowed to berth at the Oakland Container Pier.

When we sailed under the Golden Gate bridge, we were so thankful. At the container pier, all the workers yelled and welcomed us with shouts and horn blasts. We in turn yelled back our thanks and gratitude and cried.

ETSY'S SAGA

When we left the ship, we lined up for temperatures and questions. However, Etsy, my two friends and I were met by two veterinarians and their two vet assistants. We were sequestered from the other passengers. They explained that they would be staying with Etsy, examining her, and provide food and toys. It was explained to me that the vets would be coming over to our new base apartment to check Etsy every night. Her temperature would be taken and examinations would be performed. Since Etsy was the only dog on the cruise and was surrounded by some passengers and employees with the virus, she was a good candidate to come down with the disease. We knew that dogs do not pass the coronavirus on to humans; however, there

were two dogs with the virus in Hong Kong. There is also a pug dog



Emergency Eye Care

VSP members often ask, "What's considered emergency eye care? Should I go to a hospital emergency room if I'm having problems with my eyes?" Those are great questions, and here's why.

In many cases, your eye doctor can provide the help you need. This is especially important right now when reducing impacts on busy emergency rooms due to Coronavirus and minimizing your exposure to a variety of diseases in waiting rooms can be significant.

Not all eye doctors are open for routine care right now, but many are available for eye care circumstances that require immediate attention. Situations like getting hit in the eye, chemical burn, sudden onset of blurry or loss of vision, eye scratches, flashes of light or floaters, and abrupt headaches with or without visual impacts could gualify. If you have lost or broken eyewear or are low/out of contact lenses and don't have a backup pair of glasses, your eye doctor can help.

Experiencing itchy or dry eyes? Irritating as these symptoms can be, it would not be considered urgent or an emergency. Same goes for your annual eye exam or wanting to chat with your eye doctor about trying contact lenses for the first time. These inquiries are important, of course but can wait until your next appointment.

If you have an eye care emergency or essential need, consider calling your eye doctor to see if they can help.






