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District Governor Cat Gon's Message



Summertime Greetings, District 4-C5 Lions!

Well, we seemed to have survived another round of quarantine. As you can see from the photograph, I have lost several inches of hair...and 1½ pounds all within a matter of 15 minutes! <u>Thank you</u> ! for your generosity in the way of monetary gifts to bring awareness to

the profound tragedies of pediatric cancer. We have met and surpassed my objective of \$5,000 and are closely approaching \$7,000. We are short by only \$63. Donations are still being accepted, so if you think it is too late to make that donation...think this, pediatric cancer does not discriminate. "IF NOT NOW, THEN WHEN?" Our small offering may be the funds needed to assist one or more child to defeat these voracious diseases.

This past month has been filled with torrid heat, voracious fires, and continued COVID -19 social distancing. So far, we have been fortunate that no loss of life has been incurred in our district from the threats of fire, only destruction of some structures and out-buildings. Presently at 100% containment, the CA Department of Forestry is in the mopping up phase. Please take extra precautions to safeguard our fire crews, yourselves, and your homes.

Recently returned from the virtual Council of Governor's (COG) meeting August 21-23, many new ideas and procedures being implemented due to the pandemic and the threat of regional fires throughout the state has made this a very challenging meeting. Motions were made to continue to endorse 1st Vice President Douglas Alexander for Lions Clubs International (LCI) President and endorsed candidate for LCI 3rd Vice President Past International Director Fabricio Oliveira. Past District Governor Ken Ibarra also retains eligibility as Multiple District-4 (MD-4) endorsed candidate for International Director. Our November and February COG meeting will be held virtually from California unless the COVID-19 restrictions are lifted. Subsequently, the MD-4 Convention in Reno has been cancelled as the hotel cannot guarantee health and occupancy safeguards to our satisfaction.

The Council opted to have the January 27-31, 2021 convention moved to run in conjunction with the June Joint Council Meeting (TBD). To assist in the site selection process, MD-4 and the council have chosen to use a third-party venue/ meeting advisory consultants, HelmsBriscoe to search out venues and negotiate pricing that is amicable with the at no

cost to MD-4.

Student Speaker contest topic: **"Distance and Online Learning: Pros and Cons".** Packet will be sent out from the MD-4 Office in the coming weeks. Youth Protection Policy is being implemented and guidelines available on the MD-4 website at <u>https://md4lions.org/</u>.

After much consideration, Immediate Past District Governor Sarah Enloe and the convention committee have opted to move the One-Day Convention to Saturday, October 17th, 2020. This will allow for the hotel and planning committee to offer the best for our Lions and to enforce social distancing if it is still mandated.

Governor Visitations are few and mostly virtual. I have had the opportunity to meet with Meadow Vista Area Lions and the Penn Valley Hi-Graders. We met at the Meadow Vista Community Park utilizing social distancing and were able to enjoy seeing each other and exchanging ideas and upcoming events. The club is adding new young members at a regular interval...amazing even during a pandemic! The cool breeze kept the temperature down and the smoke saturations was negligible. All-in-all a wonderful meeting. Penn Valley meeting was held indoors with the room spaced to allow social distancing but active conversation. Another club that is actively soliciting for new members by inviting prospective members to learn more about the inner workings of their club.

It is amazing how different the air quality was from the foothills to the valley floor. I almost wanted to stay up in the hills. The valley was saturated with smoke and particulates that made breathing quite oppressive.

Our second installment of training sessions were presented on Saturday, August 29, 2020. All sessions were well attended. We hope to have the curriculum available on the district website for future reference.



City of Hope Makes It "Easy-Peasy"!

Are you and your Lions Club looking for a worthwhile, exciting project for your donation dollars, while we are staying safe and sheltering-in-place? The City of Hope website for the Lions Diabetes Innovation Fund makes it "easy-peasy"! The goal of this partnership between California Lions and City of Hope is to raise \$1 million in five years to be used to fund innovative research projects aimed to improve the treatment of, and cure, Type 2 Diabetes. And, with City of Hope at the helm, everything is possible!

Here's an idea that came from a couple of Lions Clubs that I visited "virtually." While Lions Clubs are meeting via Zoom, or not meeting at all, think about how much money you are saving by not purchasing meals and not paying fines. Then donate a portion of those savings to your favorite charity. And, of course, I hope that you will consider the Lions Diabetes Innovation Fund at City of Hope to be a recipient of your charitable donation.

Let's put some numbers to it. Assume that an individual decides that he or she has saved \$10 in meal costs and fines for the month. (It's probably more than that, but \$10 is an easy number to work with.) If 20 people in a Club (or their friends and family) each donate \$10 at the end of the month, that adds up to \$200. If those 20 people make that same \$10 donation each month for a year, your club suddenly has made \$2,400 in donations to the Lions Diabetes Innovation Fund! And you, and your Club, get credit for it!

It's easy for individuals to make their donations through the City of Hope website using a credit card, without placing an additional burden on your Club Treasurer. Your Club will get credited with your donation, and you will get a receipt for tax purposes from City of Hope, a 501(c)(3) organization. Just follow these "easy-peasy" directions, and your \$10 per month donation will help cure Type 2 Diabetes.

- 1.Go to the list of Districts (currently at both the top and bottom of the page).
- 2.Click on Lions District 4 C5.
- 3. Find your club name; you may need to click on "view all" if your club isn't near the top of the list.
- 4. Once you are on your club page (not before), click on "donate".
- 5. Enter your credit card information and amount of your donation.

During the Nevada City Lions regular meeting of August 12, 2020, Lion Verne Taylor, who has been a member of his club since December 1, 1982 was presented with a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow with three diamonds attached to the pin by Immediate Past President Diana Beer.

Immediately preceding Lion Diana's presentation of the Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, she presented Lion Verne with a certificate naming him as the Club Lion of the Year.

By the way, as I write this article, August 14, 2020, Lion Verne is celebrating his birthday and without divulging his age, to many, it is a milestone birthday!

Lion Verne became a Lion December 1, 1982. His sponsor was Hal Taylor, his father. Whenever there was a project to be done, you could always see both active Lions either organizing those projects or working side by side with other members of their club.

Lion Verne has served on numerous committees and positions on the District Cabinet including several times as Sierra Zone Chair and Donner Region Chair. One of his years as Donner Region Chair was during the year that Past International Director Bob Smith served as District Governor.

The large playground structure in the playground area was another of Lion Verne's projects.

Another ongoing project was Lion Verne's annual support for Diabetes Awareness as one of his sons was diagnosed in infancy with Type One Diabetes. Look for a Diabetes Awareness walk in Grass Valley in the future once the COVID restrictions have been lifted. He and Grass Valley Host Lion Krista Putnam have teamed up as organizers of that future walk, hopefully soon.

This past year, in spite of the COVID restrictions Lion Verne was always working on various projects in the community. Recently, our club performed some landscaping maintenance at the Nevada County Historical Society complex led by Lion Verne who had been in touch with the president of the Historical Society to set up the plans for our club members to participate. An earlier article describing the landscaping maintenance was included in both the Pride and the local Union Newspaper.

Another of Lion Verne's projects that he organized was the shaded waiting area next to the Nevada County Railroad Museum in Nevada City. His efforts were recognized at both the District level during the 2019 District Convention and then by Multiple District Four.

Lion Verne is well known in the Nevada City community having retired a few years ago as Public Works Director of the City of Nevada City. When you needed something done in the community you look to Verne to get it done.

Grass Valley Lion Al Koolhof—Woodworker Extraordinaire

Grass Valley Foothill Lion Al Koolhof has been serving his community and fellow man for almost 48 years. During that time he has been a member of the Willow Glen (San Jose), Sunnyvale Host, Alta Sierra, and Grass Valley Host Lions clubs. In 2005, he became a charter member of the Grass Valley Foothill Lions. A Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, Lion Al has served his clubs in many positions, including Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, Bulletin Publisher, Lion Tamer, and Tail Twister.

Married to his wife, Rose, since 1949, Lion Al was employed in the banking industry. He and Rose have four children, five grandchildren, and three great grandchildren.

Lion Al developed a passion for woodworking when he was a young man on his family's dairy farm in Winters, California. Since his father was totally blind, young Al was responsible for all the repairs necessary on the farm. During this time, he started tinkering in woodworking. High School shop classes added to his skills. In 1950, Al purchased a table saw from Montgomery



Ward. It still works, and has a prominent place in his workshop.



Lion Al added to his skills over the years by studying woodworking magazines and building complicated wooden models of heavy machinery. His family gradually added to the tools in his shop at birthdays and Christmas.

Over 40 years ago, Al started making wooden Christmas ornaments as gifts for family and friends. Then, about 10 years ago, Lion Al started making wooden toys throughout the year and donates them to the Salvation Army to distribute to needy children at Christmas. Lion Al donates well over 100 handmade wooden toys each year.


Poverty and Hunger Make Girls Desparate

"Before I guit school, I studied in school and did household chores and farming jobs. I had never heard about girls being trafficked to Delhi. I learned about this later. Now I know," a trafficked girl said.

In one situation, a neighbor in a village created a fake 'marriage.' But rather than marrying the girl, the 'groom' sold her to a Delhi brothel house. She asked the woman there, "Where are the people who brought me here?" The woman replied, "They left you here because they sold you to us."

About 20 years ago a girl named Ruth was drugged and sold by traffickers to a brothel in Mumbai, India. We know that during this period of "stay-athome" orders, human trafficking survivors have been trapped at home with their traffickers. This leaves them vulnerable to more abuse. With this in mind, we couldnot wait for the pandemic to pass to resume the
