1) Making presentations on LCIF at Lions' functions and meetings,

- 2) Writing or placing at least one article on LCIF to local Lions newsletters or websites,
- 3) Sending regular communications about LCIF to clubs members via emails or mail and
- 4) Promoting LCIF giving in other visible manners to Lions or the public.

Any Lion can nominate someone to the District LCIF Coordinator or District Governor for the award. Also everyone in the District is eligible for the award who assist with a Lions fundraiser for the District.

Coming up will be "Operation Clip Sarah," IPDG Lion Sarah will be cutting her hair for LCIF Youth Diabetes. Stay tuned for more information on this fundraiser.

I will continue to match \$20 from every club in our District and will present a Melvin Jones Fellowship to someone in our District.

2021 Youth Exchange Program

Greetings Lions!

We are starting to plan for the next year's Youth Exchange program with hopes of smoother sailing in 2021.

All incoming international students will meet in Camp Pacifica near Yosemite for 6 days from July 6 to July 11 and then have a two-week host family stay. This year we are also inviting our Leos to join the international students at camp so they can learn about the program, become friends with and introduce their guests to the American way of life. In return, our Leos will learn about differences in countries and cultures and also how similar we all are in many ways. NOTE: Japan will not be sending or accepting students in 2021.

We need Lion volunteers to drive the students from San Francisco International Airport to Camp Pacifica, and to assist at camp during the week. Please let me know if you can help!

After camp we will need host families for approximately 40 students. This year the host families are invited to join the campers on the last day of camp, have dinner and stay in cabins overnight so the driving is easier the next day. As always, we encourage you to host two students so they can help each other learn about America.

We are also taking applications for students who want to go abroad. They must be between 16-21 for most countries. Of course, we will be monitoring the COVID restrictions carefully.


Currently the cost of the program is \$100, with the students making their own transportation and insurance arrangements. The fee covers orientation, uniform, backpack, training materials, banners and pins.

Most countries have a host family visit of 1-2 weeks.


In addition, most countries set up their own camp which usually are weeklong and include all the other international students. The fee is set by the hosting country, but the average camp fee is between \$400-600.





the kitchen crew of 1st VDG Donna and Lion Brad Prince, Lion Linda Phelps and Lion Janet Proctor.


