

2021 Lions Clubs International Convention

Dear Lions,

Due to the continuing concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the board of directors voted to transition the 2021 Montreal Lions Clubs International Convention to a virtual event that will be delivered totally online. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind as limiting international travel and large gatherings is key to global containment strategies.

Although we are disappointed that we won't be able to host this event in person, we are excited about hosting our first virtual international convention that can safely connect Lions from around the world. We are still finalizing the details of your new convention experience, and will share those with you as soon as they are ready.

Here are some important details about the 2021 virtual convention we'd like to share with you:

- Everyone's invited Our 2021 convention will be a virtual event that's open to all Lions and Leos around the world.
- Registration fees The registration fee will be US\$50 until March 31, then US\$75 beginning April 1.
 The registration fee for Leos will be US\$30 regardless of date. Convention is currently scheduled for June 25-29. Additional event and registration details will be provided soon.
- **Current registrants** Lions who are currently registered for convention will receive an email soon with more information about their registration options.
- **Elections** Executive officer and international director elections will be conducted electronically, and voting procedures will be forthcoming.
- **Convention updates** Check our convention website <u>LCICon</u> for convention updates and details as they become available.

This global health pandemic has forced us all to make decisions and changes that place health and safety first. However, we are optimistic that with each new day there is hope, and as Lions, we continue to find new ways to stay connected, safely serve our communities and continue our global mission of service. We appreciate your understanding during this challenging time for our organization and the world, and thank you for your incredible service as a Lion.

Important Message from PDG Doug Wight-Food Drive Collection

Many of you received an email notification that MD4 California Lions is encouraging a February month-long food collection drive. All clubs are encouraged to participate in the month-long food collection drive and to report to MD4 and MyLion the number of pounds of non-perishable food collected and delivered to various organizations such as local Food Banks.

We discovered that several of the Food Banks in the greater Sacramento area are not accepting canned foods or other non-perishable foods, rather they are requesting money in lieu of the food donations. We have been advised that for every dollar donated it equates to 1.7 pounds of food.

If your club is participating in the worthwhile drive, we recommend that you check with the local food banks or other food distribution center to determine what their needs are.

If you find that money is the preferred donation rather than non-perishable foods, your club might want to either do a fundraiser much like we do every fall during White Cane Days or make direct money donations to your favorite food distribution center to assist the hungry. If you choose to do a fundraiser, such as setting up a table in the front of locations like grocery stores, we recommend you talk to their management to get them to buy into your efforts. You might even get monetary donations from one of the grocery stores. If you do choose to do a fundraiser, we also recommend that you publicize your event on social media or with your local newspaper.

Your event can be either an all-month long event or a single, or two-day event much like your White Cane drives.


Once you have completed your food drive or have made donations be sure to include the results of your event on any advertising you put out there when doing a membership drive.

We are told by MD4 that the food collection drive was an opportunity for clubs to have some additional activities, especially for those that have not been active due to COVID restrictions. And with some advertising of the event it often encourages possible new members joining your clubs once they see that we continue to live up to our motto of "We Serve."

Hopefully this explains the event and answers questions some of your club members may have. We encourage as many clubs as possible to participate in some way and be sure to report it when done.

LCIF 100 Percent Club

What is it? Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) has a program of giving, where every member of a Lions Club can donate to LCIF. When 100% of the Club's Membership gives a donation to LCIF during a given Lion Year, the Club will qualify as LCIF 100% Club.

How does a Club qualify? Each member of the Club must make a minimum donation of at least \$50 during the Lion Year in order to qualify as a 100% Club with LCIF.

What does it cost? Each Club must complete a form which will show the Club what the total required Club donation needs to be. Total number of Club members times \$50 equals the amount to be donated to LCIF to qualify to become a 100% Club. For example: If Club ABC has 12 members times \$50 which would be a total donation of \$600 to LCIF. There is one major factor to remember, which is, if your Club adds a new member before the end of the year, your Club will need to send in to LCIF the funds to keep the 100% Club status.

Where does the funds come from? There are several ways to collect the total amount of funds needed to donate to LCIF.

- Ask every member to donate the \$50.
- Since LCIF is a 501(c)3 Nonprofit Organization, the Club can send in a check from the Club's community account for the total amount.
- Ask every member to donate one half of the donation (\$25) and the club can donate the other one half (\$25) per Club member.
- Conduct a fundraiser for LCIF and donate the funds in the names of all the Club members (\$50 or more per member).

There is a form that will need to be completed by, either by the Club Secretary and/or the District LCIF Coordinator to be sent in with the funds. I can assist your Club with the completion of the form.

Please discuss with your Club members about becoming a LCIF 100% Club. If you would like me to speak to your club – $Just\ Ask!$ and I will be there.

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and Global Membership Reports

As of January 30, 2021, I submit the following report on the District 4-C5 actions in reference to the LCIF and GMT.

LCIF

We are ahead of last year's donations at this time! Total donations reported on LCIF Report for this year 2021-2020 is \$23,024. This is 65.7% of Governor Cat's goal of \$35,000.

- Total number of clubs donated to LCIF: 50 of 50 (100%)
- Total number of Zones visited: 8 of 8 (100%)
- ◆ Total number of Model Clubs: 1 Midtown
- Total number of clubs visited: 36 of 50 (72%)
- Total number of clubs with a Club LCIF Coordinator: 50 of 50 (100%)
- Total number of club/district fundraisers conducted for LCIF: 3
- Total number of 100% Clubs: 0 Woodland Yolo and Woodland Host are submitting their paperwork.

GMT

We have added 76 new, reinstated and transferred members to 24 clubs of our District for a 48% increase; however, and we lost 126 members. Our net progress for this year is negative 50.

- 36 of 50 (72%) Clubs have been visited about Membership
- 24 of 50 (48%) Clubs have inducted a new, reinstated or transfer member
- 8 of 8 (100%) Zones have been visited about the Membership
- 87 Lions attended the New Member Orientation Class



Bees: the most important living things on the planet

I read an article created by Earthwatch Institute (https://earthwatch.org) several years ago and what that article said about the honey-producing bee has stayed with me ever since. I rewrote that article and I include it below. I am suggesting that Lions International (LCI) get involved in beehive construction (bee boxes) while using its thousands of clubs to construct Lions-design hives, distribute informational pamphlets, and encourage hive-making everywhere.

- ◆ According to Earthwatch Institute, bees have been declared the most important living beings on this planet. Many wildlife experts and scientists consider bees to be on the long list of endangered species. In the past few years, 90% of the bee population has disappeared . . . making them extremely endangered! The uncontrolled use of pesticides, deforestation, ravaging fires and smoke, and lack of flowers are the main reasons given for their extinction.
- Why so important? Seventy percent of the world's agriculture depends exclusively on bees. Pollination of plants for reproduction happens thanks to bees. Bees are the only living beings not carrying any type of pathogen . . . a bacterium, virus, or another microorganism that can cause disease. Also, bees are crucial to have around for the

Earth's ecosystems.



I suggest LCI join the scientists who seek to stop entirely the use of deadly pesticides, and have begun promoting natural agricultural alternatives, oversee bee health and welfare and encourage more bees by reserving lands and creating bee boxes solely for bee use.

LCI should encourage every high school and Scouting troop to play key roles toward the growth and welfare of the most important living thing we still have buzzing around, the threatened bee.

Exactly one week before Thanksgiving, on November 19, 2020, the **Capitol Lions Club** and **Golden State Lions Club** co-sponsored a Blood Drive which was held at the Vitalant (formerly BloodSource) Headquarters, located at the former Mather Air Force Base near Rancho Cordova.

Scout Troop 8 from East Sacramento, a troop sponsored by the Capitol Lions Club, was also a co-sponsor, and provided tremendous assistance with publicity and donor recruitment, as well as with the serving of delicious post-donation snacks. The Blood Drive was very successful, with 29 individuals registering in advance to donate blood, and 26 "passing" their mini-physical and actually being allowed to donate. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, strict protocols were observed. The conference room provided by Vitalant was very large, making social distancing easy. Donor appointment registration was required to be done online through the Vitalant website to "disperse" the attendance, and masks were required at all times, except when eating and rehydrating after the blood donation. A big THANK YOU to all Lions, Scout Leaders and Scouts, and friends who were able to participate and donate blood! Our next Lions Community Blood Drive will occur on Saturday, March 27, 2021, 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM, at Vitalant Headquarters. We look forward to seeing you there!



It was fun to judge the little cars and we look forward to doing the judging next year about this same time of year.




