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4-C5 MEMBERSHIP REPORT

GMT Report for District 4-C5 (Jun 30, 2021)

As of today, we have added 154 new, reinstated and transferred members to 34 clubs of our District for a 68% and lost 214 members. Our net progress for this year is -60.

Our District is starting off with the following make up of members:

7/1: Total members – 1320	Total Females – 566 (42.88%)
5/1: Current members – 1275	Total Females – 555 (43.5%)

Total Males – 754 (57.12%) Total Males – 720 (56.5%)

We will received the final numbers in the middle of July for 2020-2021.

DG Cat's first membership goal was to have every club increase their membership by either 1 new/reinstated/ transfer member during each quarter or add 4 new members during the year.

The clubs that have added 4 or more new/reinstated/transfer members during the year to meet DG Cat's goals during the year are:

Her next goal was to work with clubs under 20 in membership to increase to 20 or more. Due to the Covid, we were not able to meet this goal. We started the year with 24 clubs under 20 and we finished with 24 clubs under 20. We had three clubs that did surpass the 20 member mark but we also had three clubs who went below the 20 member mark due to moves, decease and transfers. The clubs that increased to 20 and over are Esparto Lions, Roseville Host Lions and Sac Antelope Lions.



DG Donna began her life in Lions as a Charter Member of the Bear River Lioness Club so it is also homage to her own beginnings and to all former Lionesses.

The Lion is grinning because he also protects our Earth and is pleased with the shift in Lions ideology, which encourages women to join our worldwide Pride. He is standing watch over his Cub protecting and guiding the young Lion heir.

UC Davis Eye Center Grant Awarded!



At its May Board meeting, the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) approved the District's application for a grant in the amount of \$200,000 that will provide the UC Davis Eye Center with funds to purchase the critical equipment they need to create an innovative pro-

gram of vision screening that will help thousands of children with amblyopia and adults with diabetic retinopathy, especially in underserved communities, to avoid going blind. This would not have been possible without the strong collaboration by District 4-C5, the Northern California Lions Sight Association (NCLSA) and the UC Davis Eye Center and the hard work of the Grant Project Team which included Lion Co-Coordinators Dr. Ernie Takahashi and PCC Derek Ledda and Eye Center staff, including Erin Bauer, Traci Galbaugh, Rebecca Subbotin, Dr. Marcella Estrada and Dr Glenn Yiu. The challenge of raising the \$100,000 needed to match the portion that LCIF will provide was daunting but thanks to NCLSA's donation of \$75,000 and efforts by District clubs and individual Lions to raise \$20,000 more and Eye Center supporters committing to raising the remaining \$5000, we are closing in on our fundraising goal.

We are also grateful to the three lead clubs for the grant, Senator Lions Club, Maharlika Lions Club and the Higgins Diggins Lions Club that have each donated \$1000 and to the many other clubs that have made significant contributions, including the Antelope Lions Club, Colfax Lions Club, Capitol Lions Club, Sunrise Lions Club, Golden State Lions Club, Roseville Sunrise Lions Club, Placerville Lions Club and the Nevada City Lions Club to name a few. We need many more clubs and individual Lions to make donations in any amount to help us reach the finish line. We do

District 4-C5 Lions Clubs and Foundations Let's Stay in Compliance!!!

With 50 Lions Clubs <u>501(c)4</u> (referred to as Clubs) and several Foundations 501(c)3 (referred to as Foundations) in District 4-C5, we all strive to serve our communities, offering assistance when and where needed; making donations; raising funds; and so much more, doing what we do best – "We Serve."

Each of our Clubs and Foundations in doing so, need to keep our various government agencies satisfied by filing specific compliance documents along with the appropriate filing fees each year.



"Keep your clubs and foundations in compliance with IRS and LCIF rules so that you can keep serving your community!"

How do we accomplish this?

1) Ensure that your Club has its EIN on file and, if applicable, your Foundation has its **SEPARATE** EIN on file.

2) File **ANNUALLY** your Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and Franchise Tax Board (FTB) tax returns (990's to IRS and 199s to FTB) if your Club and/or Foundation's income is over \$50,000. Clubs and Foundations with income equal to or less than \$50,000, may file electronically using the **IRS Form 990-N (e-Postcard)** and for FTB use the California **FTB Form 199 (e-Postcard)**.

3) File **ANNUALLY** the RRF-1, along with your IRS 990 tax return with the California Attorney General's **(AG)** Charitable Trust Division, if your Club and/or Foundation's income is over \$50,000. Additionally, Clubs and Foundations with income equal to or less than \$50,000, must file the Form CT-TR1 along with the Form RRF-1.

4) File the SI-100, along with a fee of \$20, with the Secretary of State (if your Club was chartered in an odd number year, you file the SI-100 in all odd number years, or if chartered in an even number year, you file the S1-100 in the even number years). Additionally, there is **NO FEE** for submitting a Statement of Information to update the Entity record in between filing periods, for example the changing of Officers.



Also, the following is some important general information that Lions Clubs 501(c)4 and Foundations 501 (c)3 need to be aware of, because it is critical to understand to be in complete compliance. All **NEW** Lions Clubs 501(c)4 and Lions Foundations 501(c)3 **must submit** a formation application to Lions Clubs International (LCI) and receive formation approval and be properly registered with the IRS; State of California FTB; AG's Charitable Trust Division; and Secretary of State (SOS), prior to engaging in charitable activities.

ALL Lions Clubs 501(c)4 are under the group exemption of LCI 501(c)4 organization and cannot be changed. Donations to these clubs are **NOT** ordinarily tax deductible to the donor.

A Lions Club may create a separate Lions Foundation as a 501(c)3 in addition to its required creation of a 501(c)4 organization, which will allow some donations to be tax deductible. <u>The Lions Club then ends</u> <u>up with two separate entities</u>. In this case, these entities, The Lions Club 501(c)4 under LCI's group exemption, as well as the Lions Foundation under the 501(c)3 exemption, each of which, will have its own <u>SEPARATE EIN NUMBER</u> and must complete its own IRS and State of California tax and charitable annual filings. The Lions Foundation 501(c)3 must be independent of the normal administration of the Lions Club 501(c)4 and have its own Board of Directors.

This year, District Governor Donna Prince has formed a new District 4-C5 Compliance Committee to assist new clubs in properly registering with all entities, plus assist and answer questions for existing clubs. Our committee is comprised of:

We can also provide your Club and/or Foundation with a detailed compliance guide that, if followed, will enable your Club and Foundation to file the required documents easily and stay in compliance. We are here to help – so please, reach out to us when needed.

Lions Clubs International and MD-4 Dues Reminder

As we begin the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022, each Lions Club in District 4-C5 is planning wonderful projects that fulfill our motto, "We Serve." And by now we have all put together both our Community/Project fund budgets and our Administrative funds budgets.

In preparing those two budgets, each club should have prepared Administrative budgets which includes the cost of payment of both Lions Clubs International (LCI) and Multiple District Four (MD-4) annual dues. In your planning we assume that you will have budgeted enough in your membership dues to cover both LCI and MD-4 due plus having enough funds built into your Administrative budgets to cover any other club administrative costs to operate your club during the year without going in the hole.

You will receive an invoice from LCI in July for six months membership dues and again in January for the balance of the six months membership dues. Additionally, you will receive an invoice from MD-4 in February covering six months of membership dues that includes the dues for both MD-4 and District 4-C5, and again in February for the remaining six months in our club year.

We urge all clubs to remit both sets of dues promptly to keep in good standing with both LCI and MD-4. As to the MD-4 dues statements, once you have remitted those dues payable to MD-4, they in turn will take their portion from the remittance and forward the balance back to District 4-C5. The current system is a little clumsy, but in the long run, our District has been living with the payment system to date. Our issue at the district level is that the district income is dependent on your clubs remitting to MD-4 promptly as it takes some time for the MD-4 office to send us our portion of income to run the district. Your cooperation in remitting both LCI and MD-4 dues upon receipt of their invoices is greatly appreciated. *CT/PDG Doug Wight*

How Serious Is America's Literacy Problem?

According to the International Literacy Association, there are 781 million people in the world who are either illiterate (cannot read a single word) or functionally illiterate (with a basic or below basic ability to read). Some 126 million of them are young people. That accounts for 12 percent of the world's population.

According to the National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES), 21 percent of adults in the United States (about 43 million) fall into the illiterate/functionally illiterate category. Nearly two -thirds of fourth graders read below grade level, and the same number graduate from high school still reading below grade level, meaning, they don't catch up. This puts the United States well

behind several other countries in the world, including Japan, all the Scandinavian countries, Canada, the Republic of Korea, and the UK.

Breaking the below-grade-level reading numbers out further: 35 percent are white, 34 percent Hispanic, 23 percent African American, and 8 percent "other." Non-U.S.-born adults make up 34 percent of the low literacy/illiterate U.S. population. New Hampshire, Minnesota, and North Dakota have the highest literacy rates (about 94 percent), while California has the low-est (77 percent).

WHY IT MATTERS

The risks to people who can't read or can barely read are significant, including:

HEALTH The *American Journal of Public Health* reports that the inability to read and understand health information leads to poverty, and poverty to poor health care. Studies have linked low literacy to problems with understanding and using preventive services, delayed diagnosis of illnesses, ability to follow medical instructions, and more.

EMPLOYMENT The National Council for Adult Learning point to non-productivity in the workforce, crime, and loss of tax revenue due to unemployment as the result of low literacy skills. The Bureau of Labor Statistics has data showing a strong relationship between attaining higher educational levels and better employment opportunities.

POVERTY The National Institute of Literacy says that 43 percent of adults with the lowest literacy levels live in poverty. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the official poverty rate in 2018 was 11.8 percent, down slightly from 2017. But 17.6 percent of Hispanic people and 20.8 percent of African Americans were classified as being in poverty, much higher than the average, and both groups saw an increase from 2017. Literacy and income are tied closely together, though race-based discrimination affects Hispanic people and African Americans in the employment market, making it harder to earn incomes comparable to white people even at equivalent educational levels.

GENERATIONAL LITERACY Adult poverty in turn impacts children; 61 percent of lowincome families have no children's books in their homes, which affects the child's ability to develop the skills to begin reading on their own. The Annie E. Casey Foundation reports that 68 percent of fourth graders in the United States read at a below proficient level, and of those, 82 percent are from low-income homes. The National Bureau of Economic Research says 72 percent of children whose parents have low literacy skills will likely be at the lowest reading levels themselves. The pattern sets in early: the American Library Association says a child who is a poor reader at the end of first grade has a 90 percent chance of still being a poor reader at the end of fourth grade, and poor readers at the end of their fourth grade tend to still be poor readers even if they graduate from high school.

<u>CRIME</u> The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) has data showing that 75 percent of state prison inmates are either classified as low literate or did not complete high school. The Literacy Project Foundation reported that three out of five people in prison can't read, and 85 percent of youth offenders struggle to read.

HOW LIONS CAN HELP For over ten years Lions International has urged clubs to support literacy in all of its forms. In District 4C5 this support has manifested itself in two main ways: At the creation of Donna Prince, our 2021-2022 District Governor, many of our clubs conduct Reading Contests in elementary and middle schools. The children have great fun reading books of their choice and competing for prizes; they become very successful at The Literacy Project Foundation reported that three out of five people in prison can't read, and 85 percent of youth offenders struggle to read.

improving their reading skills. The second way of supporting literacy is by becoming a parttime, one-on-one tutor to learners in County Library Adult Literacy Programs. Contact your library for details.

After reviewing the status of literacy in the United States, and throughout the world, there is no doubt of the need for helping children and adults improve their ability to read; how it will greatly improve their lives in many ways. How children can become better students by understanding the materials they are trying to master, and how adults can better perform their current jobs, and qualify for jobs with improved pay and benefits with stronger reading skills. We can help raise people up out of poverty to lead a happier and more complete life. Helping people strengthen their literacy skills allows them to work on their own behalf to improve their lives, and take personal pride in their own achievements, rather than relying on taxpayer supported social programs.


WOODLAND'S LITERACY CONTEST
