As Caldor Fire Threatens, District 4C5 Lions Mobilize to Provide Disaster Relief with Aid from LCIF

So much has taken place this month I barely know where to start, so I will begin with the first week in August.

Lions Clubs International Foundation's Emergency Grants provide up to US\$10,000 for districts impacted by a natural disaster. Lions' district governors may apply for Emergency Grants to help meet immediate needs such as food, water, clothing, and medical supplies. LCIF awards nearly US\$2 million in emergency grant funding each year.

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The Council of Governor's Meeting was held in Irvine, CA, August 5-8th. VDGs Tim Luckinbill, Zenny Yagen and I spent the weekend at various meetings and caucus sessions addressing MD-4 business. One agenda item was selecting the Student Speaker Contests topic: "How Can Kindness Reunite Our Country?" Our District Chair is 2VDG Zenny and she is urging all clubs to order their kit from the MD4 before October 1st (after that date there is a charge).

Just before we left for Irvine, the River Fire started in the Colfax area. 1VDG Tim and Mary Ann were evacuated from their home, but were able to return. We were updated often on the fire status and the relief efforts. The community stepped up and provided shelter, food and other items the evacuees needed, so much so that the shelters closed after just a few days. While more than 100 structures were destroyed, this fire could have been much worse.

Sadly, on August 14, the Caldor Fire ignited in El Dorado County. As of this writing, over 219,000 acres have burned and the fire is only 19% contained. The number of structure destroyed is over 1,000 with many more threatened. The day after the fire start, more and more people were evacuated and the number of shelters grew quickly, from two to five, with four more faith-based shelters established.

On August 19 at 11pm, I decided to apply for an Emergency Disaster Grant for \$10,000 from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) to purchase basic necessities for the evacuees (blankets, clothing, toiletries, etc.). Within 11 hours, the grant was approved. Our Cabinet Secretary Evelyn Butler, who lives in El Dorado Hills, was already busy



coordinating with the El Dorado County Community Foundation, who coordinated with the American Red Cross and the faith-based shelters,

tracking the locations and needs of evacuees. She started a master list of requested items and began contacting our Lions for donations. The response was immediate, proving again, *"Where There's a Need, There's a Lion".*

Our Global Action Team Coordinators, Jeri "JT" Retzlaff, Jeri Wartena and PDG Andy Anderson immediately went to work as soon as our District Disaster Chair PDG Mike and Lion Sheri Retzlaff offered their warehouse as the collection and distribution point. JT volunteered to serve as the intake manager and began the cataloging of items.

Our clubs quickly acted when notified of the urgent need for towels, washcloths and pillows. LCIF grants are quite restrictive regarding what items the funds may purchase and the Governor is asked to specify what the money will purchase. In a nutshell, the grant covers basic necessities to benefit people (such as food, water, clothing, toiletries, first aid items, flashlights, bedding). Since the shelters had not requested towels and pillows when I applied for the grant I did not include them. Our Team was concerned LCIF would deny the items, thus our Lions were asked to help.

On August 25, our Disaster trailer driven by PDG Mike, delivered items to three evacuation sites assisted by many of our Lions. Tables were set up and the evacuees could receive what they needed. I helped at two sites and it was a very emotional experience. To see people who had no idea if their home was still standing , thank you profusely for a blanket and pillow or a sweatshirt is very humbling.

As I write this message our individual members

and Clubs have donated nearly \$8000 in cash and goods for this relief project. Unfortunately as the fire rages on, the need will grow. The evacuation area is expanding and as people who have been staying in hotels exhaust their funds they are expected to enter shelters.

As news of the Caldor Fire spread, I received an email from Past Council Chair Bob Stewart, who is the President of the California Lions Foundation (CLF). He informed me that CLF has disaster grants available and indicated I could apply for one if our need to assist continues. Our Disaster Team will evaluate our donations and the situation at the shelters and the decision will be made whether to apply for the CLF grant.

Both the LCIF and CLF grants are available to Districts because of the donations our members and clubs make to both foundations. Thank you for supporting both.

Our first District Cabinet Meeting at William Land Park sponsored by the Sacramento on August 21st was fabulous! Region Chair Josephine Fong put in a special order for cooler weather and Mother Nature heard her! Zone Chairs Jack Edwards and Brent Showalter along with all the clubs in their Zones stepped up and delivered a fun-filled day that started with a Continental breakfast and great forums and ended with Bingo and a nice sack lunch. I sat with PDG John Lynch and Gloria and it was fun to see them pull the treats out of their bags. PDG John wanted to swap his chocolate chip cookies for Gloria's fudge cookies but she didn't go for it! Thank you for all your hard work Sacramento Region, the **Cabinet Meeting was perfectly** wonderful!

In the past two months I have truly enjoyed the visits to your clubs with our Cabinet Members. The opportunity to meet our amazing Lions and to see the enthusiasm you have for serving others is very inspiring. And it is very exciting to see our Pride grow every week! I love presenting my purple District Governor pin to new Lions and you their Sponsors. Please keep sharing the joy service as a Lion brings to you by inviting others into our family.





The first pick-up is always the hardest. I don't think our area has been cleaned in years. When we jumped in the truck at the end of our work, the truck bed was totally full. We find a easy turnout for Cal Trans, drop the trash bags and other debris, which they pick up at a later date. And this means-another good service project under our belts. If you're looking for a good workout, sign up for a highway clean-up!

DISTRICT 4-C5 ANGELS IN SERVICE TO THE CALDOR FIRE VICTIMS



Our District 4-C5 leaders and Lions were quick to live up to our motto "We Serve" by acting quickly during the past week to provide desperately needed relief to the Caldor fire victims who were forced to evacuate to relief centers in Cameron Park and Placerville. Supported in part by an emergency grant of \$10,000 from the Lions Clubs International Foundation, with additional donations of more than \$7500 from clubs and individual members, District Governor Donna Prince, Cabinet Secretary Evelyn Butler and District Global Leadership Team Coordinator Jeri Retzlaff were masterful in planning and coordinating the collection and distribution of critical emergency supplies. These included clothing, blankets, towels, pillows and pillowcases, hygiene products, hand sanitizers and cleaning products. With Covid-19 and other health safety concerns in mind, our Lions purchased all the collected items brand new.

After receiving the urgent request for help, District 4-C5 immediately acted on Monday, August 23, 2021, collecting and organizing the needed supplies. This was done at the District's designated relief staging – center at Total Service Logistics in the Army Depot, which is owned and so generously made available by District Disaster Preparedness Chair PDG Mike Retzlaff and Lion Sheri Retzlaff.





The next day, our Lions delivered the supplies to about 130 evacuees at the Rolling Hills Church in El Dorado Hills, the Evelyn Bishop Hall in Ione and the Cameron Park Community Center. On the following Thursday and Friday, Lions responded to a request from the Bayside Church shelter in Placerville and delivered 400 rolls of toilet paper and 22 containers of insect repellant for the 100 evacuees living in RV's, tents or in the church hall.

The District continued to collect supplies in preparation for what was to be the Lions' most significant relief effort, which took place last Tuesday at the Green Valley Community Church in Placerville where over 300 evacuees are sheltered, with more arriving every day who have no alternatives for housing. Most of the 15 dedicated Lions who worked that day were there for 9 hours, working to the point of exhaustion but with spirits soaring. There were endless "aha" moments from serving people and families that desperately needed our help and who were so grateful to receive it. The Lions are joined in the collaborative relief effort by the Sacramento Volunteer Organizations Active on Disasters, The El Dorado Community Foundation, the American Red Cross and Hands-On Sacramento, which is the lead coordinator of the volunteer organizations. With the fires still spreading, the evacuees need all the help they can get. Our work is not done. The Lions will continue to serve the fire victims

because that's what we do - we serve the community wherever there is a need. With tears of gratitude and comforting hugs, evacuees at the distribution sites were calling the Lions their angels, which certainly fits with the Lions' spirit of caring and mission of service.

Mother Lode Lions Helping Evacuees of the Caldor Fire

The thought of fire burning its way across the country side is scary enough, but when you not only can smell it and you can see it, then people that you know are told to evacuate, you realize that you may be next in line to leave everything behind and take only what you can pack in the car in the next fifteen minutes. When the Caldor Fire broke out, that was what affected the members of the Mother Lode Lions. By the time the worst was over, eight to ten of our members had to evacuate along with several hundred other people and others suddenly found themselves next in line list. Fortunately, when the smoke cleared and the firefighters started moving off to other fires burning across California, those of our members, who had been evacuated and were permitted to return home, faced only the task of getting rid of the lingering smoke. What did the Mother Lode Lions do during the time of evacuation? Chris Didlot found out that the Salvation Army had set up shop at the **Cameron Park Community Center and** knowing that facility was small, she contacted the Salvation Army and asked if they would

like to use our kitchen, which had just been cleaned and upgraded, to expand their operation. The Salvation Army came up and looked at our kitchen and hall and the next day a team from Santa Rosa moved in and set up shop. The tables in the hall were soon stacked with bags and boxes of groceries to be used in preparing those meals. They began preparing breakfasts, lunches, and dinners to be delivered to the various evacuation centers. Most went to the evacuees who had taken refuge at the Green Valley Church. The team was preparing six hundred meals a day. The team from Santa Rosa worked for a week or so and then were replaced by a team from Yuba City.

The Mother Lode Lions parking lot was also put to use, not only for the various cars, vans, and trucks from the Salvation Army, but with eight or nine RV's with people who had been evacuated.

The Mother Lode Lions received donations from the Roseville-Sunrise Lions and several Lions and was asked to put those funds to use where they would help the most. There were a number of good ideas put forth and in the end the Mother Lode Lions matched those funds and donated them to the Salvation Army to help purchase the groceries to make meals for the evacuees.

Most everyone has left now that the fire has moved on or been put out, there is still the smell of smoke as a reminder of the Caldor fire. Other fires in California linger on and some people have lost everything but the clothes on their back and so the work of Lions goes on.

We will also celebrate our Placerville and Lions communities, "Serving Together for The Greater Good."

FILIPINO CHICKEN ADOBO

INGREDIENTS

For Chicken & Marinade

- 1.5 lbs Chicken Thighs (I use bone-in for juicier meats)
- 3 Garlic Cloves, minced
- 1/3 cup Soy Sauce
- 1/3 cup + 2 Tbsp White Vinegar
- 3 Bay Leaves, dried

For Cooking

- 2 Tbsp Oil (1 Tbsp added into the pan 2 separate times)
- 3 Garlic Cloves, minced
- 1 small Onion, diced
- 1 ½ cup Water
- 2 Tbsp Brown Sugar
- 2 tsp pepper

For Serving

2 Green Onions, sliced (for garnish)

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Combine Chicken and Marinade ingredients in a bowl. Marinate for 20 minutes or up to overnight.
- 2. Heat one (1) Tbsp Oil in a skillet over high heat.
- 3. Remove Chicken from marinade (set marinade aside) and place chicken in the pan.
- 4. Sear both sides until brown: 2.5 to 3 minutes each side. DO NOT cook Chicken all the way through.
- 5. Remove Chicken from the skillet and set aside.
- 6. Heat the 2nd Tbsp of Oil in the skillet. Add Garlic and Onion and saute for 1½ minutes.
- 7. Add the reserved Marinade + water, sugar and black pepper.
- 8. Bring mixture to a boil and then turn heat down from high to medium high. Let cook for 5 minutes.
- 9. Add Chicken smooth side down.
- 10. Simmer uncovered for 20 25 minutes (no need to stir).
- 11. After 15 minutes, turn Chicken in the pan. The sauce should reduce down to a thick, jam-like syrup.
- 12. If the sauce isn't thick enough, remove Chicken and place onto a plate. Let the pan simmer by itself; it will thicken much quicker.
- 13. Return the Chicken to the skillet to coat in the glaze.
- 14. Sprinkle the sliced Green Onions on top of the Chicken for garnish. Serve hot and ENJOY!




