Hello Fellow Lions!

I hope you and your families are doing well and enjoying this cool weather.

At the Filipino Community of Sacramento and Vicinity's FilAm History Month Celebration on October 8, 2022, the six FilAm Lions Clubs (Mabuhay, Valley Hi, Midtown, Maharlika, Golden State, and Malaya) were honored as the ICONS along with other outstanding and distinguished Filipino leaders.

I had the honor and privilege of accepting the award on behalf of the six Lions Clubs. As I was preparing my acceptance speech, I wanted to talk about Lionism, especially since there were many people attending the celebration who may not be familiar with what Lions do. Since the award was going to the six Lions Clubs, I wanted to focus on the achievements of these Lions Clubs, in terms of how many people they served; number of hours they performed serving; number of service projects, and the total amount of donations. Because my acceptance speech had to be short, I could not report those activities by club, rather, I reported in the numbers in aggregate. While I was collecting the data from My Lion, it was interesting and impressive.

For this article, I decided to expand my research on My Lion to determine the same data for all the clubs that I had previously collected for the six FilAm Lions Clubs. The following report covers the current year (July 2022 – September 2022) and last year (July 2021 – June 2022) as reported by the clubs. The following shows just how busy the clubs were last year and how they continue to serve. The four categories are: People Served; Service Completed; Volunteer Hours; and Donations.

Hello, MD4C5 Lions!

It's been a busy summer and I'm happy to do visitations and see you!

One of the highlights of my summer was volunteering for Lions Wilderness Camp for Deaf Children at Camp Ross Relles in Nevada City.

Lions Wilderness Camp for Deaf Children is a 501(c)(3) foundation that plans and runs three camps in MD4. For Northern California's hearingimpaired kids, the camp is in Nevada City. For Southern California's hearing-impaired kids, the camp is at Teresita Pines. And for Central California's hearing-impaired kids, the camp was at Camp Pacifica near Yosemite (this camp recently closed, so next year those kids will have to choose between North and South camps, or they can attend both).



The camps are planned so that the weeklong camps run consecutively. The Wilderness Camp for is always the first week in August so that the families can plan their schedules accordingly.

The theme for this year's camp was "Space!" The kids made cool planets that were hung in the dining room and ate things like "asteroids with alien tentacles" (spaghetti and meatballs) and were just having a blast being together.

At Wilderness Camp, the meals are so quiet that you can hear a pin (or plate, cup or fork) drop! One of the most interesting things for me was working in the kitchen and realizing that the meal had already started. I grew up going to camps and being a camp counselor. Mealtime was always SO noisy with all the kids getting back together after their activities. At Wilderness Camp, the meals are so quiet that you can hear a pin (or plate, cup or fork) drop! I had to peek out to make sure they were really eating. And they were, talking with their hands and smiling and enjoying each other's company. I treasure that memory.

Next year I plan to volunteer again and bring a sleeping bag so I can stay longer. If you can, come join me! They always need helping hands and there are extra cabins to stay in. By volunteering and contributing to the Lions Wilderness Camp for Deaf Children, we can keep the camp open for no

cost to the families and give the children a week where they can make friends and feel included in every activity. It's a wonderful week and I'm very grateful that I was able to be a small part of it.

As of October 28, 2022, we have added 39 new members to 19 clubs of our District for a 38% increase. We lost a total of 33, giving us a net growth of +6 so far for this year. Losses are for Death – 6, Moved – 3, Non-Payment of Dues – 7, Good Standing – 17



Hello Fellow Lions!

Thank you, Lions of District 4-C5 for serving above and beyond and supporting California Cares - Project Care. In August, 32 clubs found a variety of ways to serve the youth throughout our district. From school supply giveaways to swim or movie nights to feeding events to sight and more, over 2,100 hours were contributed to assist over 22,000 children! Give yourselves a hand!

October was Vision month, with initial numbers showing 22 service activities assisting 7,698 people with vision needs. Clubs hosted White Cane Days, vision screening with the Northern California Lions Sight Association Vision Van and Plus Optics screening, provided glasses for students in need, collected used eyeglasses, and raised awareness regarding vision issues in their communities. Reports are still being filed in MyLion, so I look forward to sharing even more information with one and all.

Year to date, 38 of our 50 clubs have entered service activities in MyLion. I know four additional clubs have completed projects but have not entered them as of today. Let's help our Governor have a 100% district in service to our communities! Collectively we have completed 1,414 service activities, serving 20,686 people.

Remember, our December Challenge is to reach out to the military and first responders in our communities however you think best. Maybe you want to do some gifts for children or take a meal to the local Fire Department. What about Christmas cards or care packages for military serving overseas. I'm thinking all of our communities have a VFW Post or American Legion Hall. Reach out and see what we can do to enrich our veterans' lives.



# "Healthy Eyes for All" - a.k.a. "White Cane Day"

If you were at the Antelope and Watt Avenue WalMart on the morning of Saturday, October 8th, you saw the oversized Northern California Lions Sight Association Vision Van parked out front of the entrance alongside two volunteer pop up tents and a dozen smiling, cheerful Antelope Lion members. This group of Lions had a mission that morning - to promote their "Healthy Eyes for All - Antelope Lions in support of White Cane Day" event. The goal was to hand out branded colorful balloons to kids while simultaneously chatting with parents about their cause. Used eyeglasses were dropped in the Recycle for Sight box, monetary donations for the purchase of eyeglasses for students in need were collected and several pairs of kids sunglasses were handed out that Saturday in front of WalMart.

The event was promoted on social media and 103.9 The Fish radio station. The publicity brought awareness to the Lions Vision Van being open for service that morning and afternoon. The skilled Dr. Salazar (Eagle Eye Vision) donated a few hours of her time to conduct free eye screenings for anyone interested in stopping by. We know the publicity worked - there was a woman waiting at WalMart since 7:30 that morning to have her eyes checked! The new general manager of WalMart, Jorge, swung by the Antelope Lions Club booth to share his personal story of being a former Lions Club member and his passion for the Lions mission. It looked like quite the colorful spectacle that morning and afternoon as the Antelope Lions Club volunteers continued to greet, dance, wave, shout, cheer and share their mission with passersby.



After the six-hour event concluded, a large box of glasses were collected along with \$120 in cash and well over a dozen eye screenings completed. The event was a win for the Antelope Lions, and they knew they wanted to do a second event to promote their "*Healthy Eyes for All*" cause.

Two short weeks later the Antelope Lions Club volunteers were at it again, this time out at hole number ten at the Lincoln Hills Golf Course at the Sacramento Maharlika Lions Foundation Golf Tournament. Golfers who came upon hole number ten were greeted by four enthusiastic Lions ready to serve up limoncello shots, lemon cookies, lemon loaf cake and lemon cheesecake at a cheerful lemon themed booth. Golf-



ers happily forked over generous donations to the "Healthy Eyes For All" cause and toasted with the limoncello shots under glorious weather. The event was another win for the Antelope Lions Club, raking in an additional \$272 for their eyeglasses fund.

# Woodland Host Lions 100th Anniversary

Woodland Host Lions celebrated their 100th Anniversary Saturday, Nov. 5th, 2022. An organizational meeting was held Oct. 20th and the club was charted on Nov. 1, 1922. It is recognized as Woodlands first service club and the oldest in Yolo county.

The keynote speaker was Past International Director Bill Crawford. Director Crawford presented Woodland Host President Jeff Walton with a Melvin Jones award. A Melvin Jones is the highest award given in Lions International. It is named after the founder of Lions who asked existing clubs in the Chicago area to pull together and work with each other to improve their communities. Lions began with the motto "We Serve".



Crawford touched on the highlights of Woodland Host Lions History including its first president Emil Kraft attending the 1925 Lions convention where Helen Keller challenged the Lions to become "Knights of the Blind". Many historically prominent Woodlanders have been members of Woodland Host including Henry J. Bush, Richard B. Cranston, John H. Ferns, and James Noble. PID Crawford also noted that Woodland Host's focus is on our youth. They participate in the Lions Student Speaker Contest and Special Kids Day. In the local schools they do Flag Day Education, run a Literacy Program to encourage reading, and participate in Child Spree giving kids a chance to buy clothes, school supplies and get their vision checked each year. The Host Lions also care for and maintain the scout cabin and sponsor Packs 499 and 1932 and Troop 69.

Finally, PID Crawford talked about International Lions focus areas of diabetes, vision, hunger, environment, and childhood cancer, and the work they do in disaster relief. Since 1968 Lions International Foundation has given grants totaling 1 billion dollars. This has been given to 13,000 grant requests.

The items were taken to Placer County fairgrounds by Lions Verne and Krista. Both clubs were very appreciative of all the support received!



PCC Sue was a pioneer by being the first woman Council Chair in MD-4 which at that time included California and Nevada. PCC Sue and PDG Bob were the first husband and wife team of Governor and Vice Governor in District 4-C3 and the second in MD-4. Throughout their time together they were a team in business and in Lions.

A California Native she was brought up in the tradition of the Golden Bears of UC California where she attended many of the collegiate games, especially football. Her father Harold "Brecky" Breakenridge played for Cal as a quarterback and kicker, was part of the famous Rose Bowl game of 1929 when Roy Riegels ran the wrong way after picking up a fumble. She grew up knowing many of the players of that era. Being a Cal Bears Fan PDG Bob proposed to PCC Sue by having a plane fly over Stanford Stadium during a BIG Game with a banner that read "Sue I Love You Will You Marry Me". She did say yes.

After graduating high school, she was fortunate to be appointed a Congressional Aide for Congressman John J. Allen Jr. and spent two years in Washington, D.C. PCC Sue attended Business College and worked in the real estate field. In her early marriage years, she raised two wonderful children Beth Sloan of Nebraska and Greg Griffin of California.

Later in life she acquired a company that provided and maintained live plants for a variety of commercial businesses including personal homes. Being very creative, PCC Sue decorated Christmas trees and provided other decorations for their facilities. She named her company Sue-z-Bee's.

At the same time, she met PDG Bob, and they both ran the company together. They were partners in Lions and business.

One of the first members she brought into the Walnut Creek Host Lions Club was PDG Bob.

Among her many contributions during her Lions years, Sue was extremely proud of three:

- When PDG Bob was Vice District Governor, they chaired the first committee to begin working on Mateo's Dream, a Park for Children of All Abilities in District 4-C3, Concord, CA. It was the first wheelchair accessible park in California. She continued with support off Mateo's Dream while s Vice Governor, Governor and Council Chair.
- Chairing the committee with PDG Bob for Lions Special Kids Day in District 4-C3 and growing the attendance to 1000
  participants. Lions Special Kids Day is a free day of fun, food, fellowship and family for special needs children. Following later
  in District 4-C5 with PDG Bob they established and co-chaired a committee to establish Lions Special Kids Day in their new
  district. The day grew to over 1000 participants in Lions District 4-C5.
- 3. Establishing the Lincoln Hills Lions Club in Lincoln California in 2010 with 45 charter members.

PCC Sue has received a number of International Presidential Certificates of Appreciation, was awarded the International President's Award Medal, International Presidents Leadership Medal the MD-4 Excellence Award and a number of District Governor Appreciation Awards.

She will be missed by many Lions.

PCC Sue was proud to be a Melvin Jones fellow, a Harry J. Aslan Fellow of the Student Speakers Foundation, has a Lions Project for Canine Companions for Independence Abdul Award, and Is a Life Member of the Lions Eye Foundation,




